Dedication Ceremony Memorial site

STOUFFVILLE — The Veterans' Memorial, an impressive project located near the easterly entrance to the Stouffville Cemetery, was dedicated at a special service, Sunday.

Rows of crosses, each bearing the name of a serviceman or servicewoman interred outside of Stouffville, have been erected by members of Royal Canadian Legion Branch 459. A centre walk and exterior fence will be installed later.

Ray McFadden, the ceremony chairman, recognized the work of Ivan Goudie, one of the project's main promoters. Mr. Goudie is a Legion Past-President. He and member Tom Johnston raised the flags after which wreaths were placed at the base of the cairn.

Mayor Eldred King in complimenting the Legion Branch on its work, echoed Mr. McFadden's words in praising the energy and enthusiasm displayed by

Mr. Goudie. He said he was pleased the Town could play some part in the project and that the dedication was timed to coincide with the Service of Remembrance.

The Last Post and Reveille were sounded by Bugler Kent Wideman. Previous to the ceremony, Legion members placed flags and poppies at the gravesites of veterans in the cemetery.

We remembered

STOUFFVILLE — "Do this in remembrance of me," Christ said to his disciples.

With that quotation from the Bible, Rev. Donald Payne of Stouffville Baptist Church, told a Remembrance Day crowd at Stouffville Legion, Sunday, that Christ made that statement, because "they forget so quickly."

In the same manner, a Remembrance Day service is held each year, so that people won't forget the contributions made by Canada's men and women during two world wars, the speaker said.

"It is important to recall the sacrifices of others that our freedom may be retained," Rev. Payne said. "How soon we forget."

He told the gathering they "honored them by their presence."

He said that "God has always richly blessed Canada," both in natural resources and in making it a "free democracy." There were no secret police in Canada, no Siberian wastelands; Canadians have freedom of speech and religion, and the right to vote as they please.

"Canada is worth fighting for, and when pressed by anarchy, worth dying for," Rev. Payne said.

However, Canadians had pursued pleasure to a large degree and forgotten the true values. "This is one of the richest countries in the world; with this there is a danger," the speaker said.

"We have to turn back to God."

Also participating, were: Rev. Ted Green, Rev. John Hamilton and Rev. Jacob Small and Jean Hammond, pianist.

Following the service, a color guard, including members of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 459 and other veterans; the Legion Ladies Auxiliary and members of the Air Cadets; and Ballantrae Scouts, Cubs, Guides and Brownies, paraded to the Civic Square for the placing of wreaths.

The procession was led by the Uxbridge Legion Pipe Band, with Comrade William Kingsley, parade marshal.

At the cenotaph, bugler, Kent Wideman played The Last Post and Reveille. Two minute's silence was observed, and Rev. Payne delivered prayer.

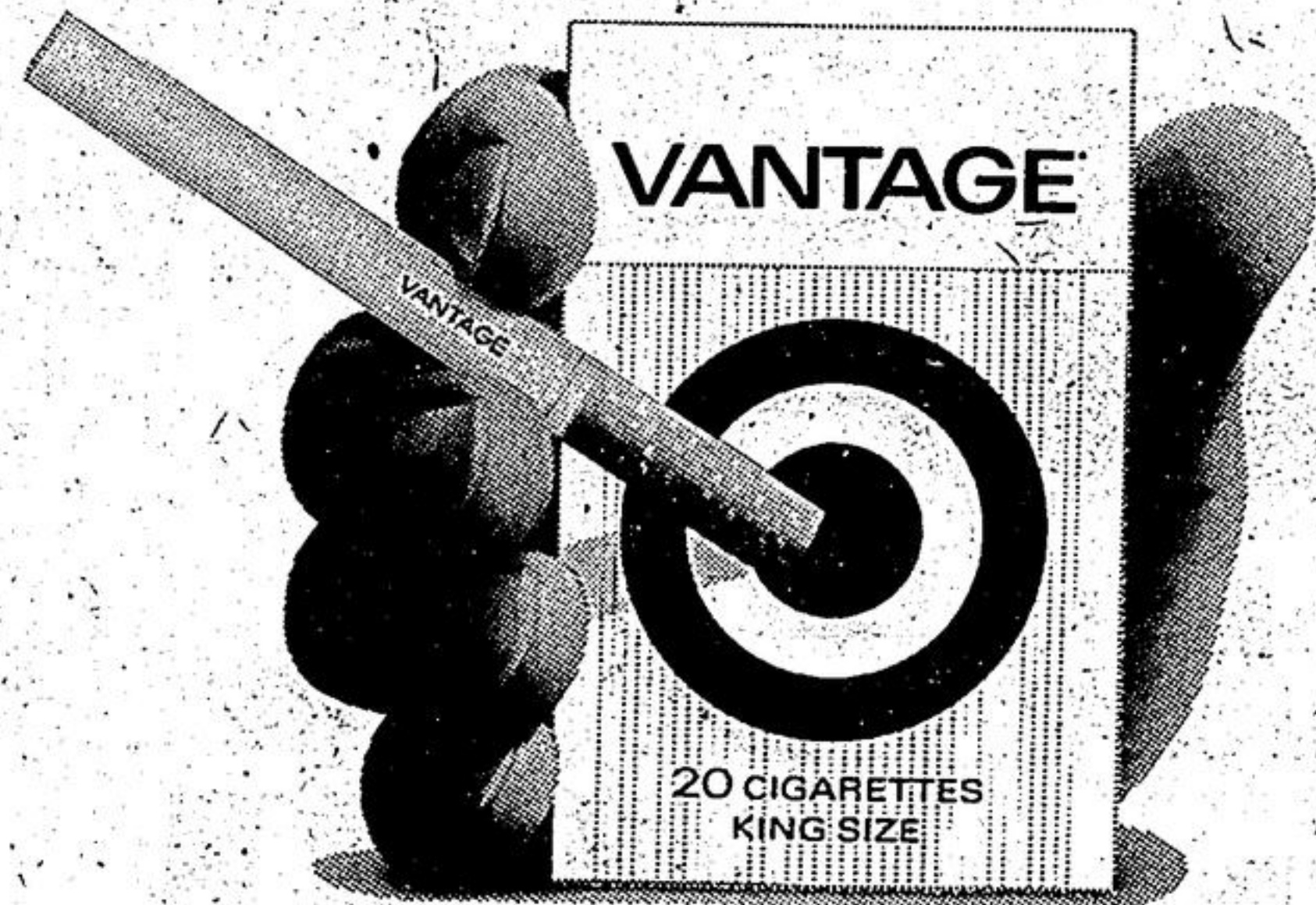
Test van
