

Town of Pickering Mayor beats three rivals

PICKERING — John Anderson is back at the helm in Pickering. The soft-spoken but dedicated mayor was returned to office, Monday, defeating his closest rival, Councillor Doug Dickerson by 1,399 votes.

Mayor Anderson polled 3,891 to 2,492 for Dickerson. Ken Matheson ran third with 2,371 and Don Kitchen fourth with 1,515.

Elected to Regional Council were - Laurie Cahill, Ward One (2,766); Alex Robertson, Ward Two (1,293); Gerry Fisher, Ward Three (1,398).

Town Councillors elected were - Peggy Byers, Ward One (911); Shane Coburn, Ward Two (1,125); Norah Stoner, Ward Three (2,153).

Durham Board of Education Trustees elected were - Lorna

Murphy, Ward One (1,488); Peter Robertson, Ward Two (1,843). Linda Carder was acclaimed in Ward 3.

For Regional Council, Ward 1, Laurie Cahill, outdistanced

Heinz Raedisch, 2,766 to 732. The result was close in Ward 2 with Alex Robertson edging trustee Jim Chalk, 1,293 to 1,223. Gayle Gray trailed with 981. In Ward 3, Gerry Fisher was an easy winner, 1,398 to 939 for Wayne Arthurs. Earle Pilkey ran third with 761.

For Town Council, Peggy Byers was well out front in Ward 1 followed by Maurice Brenner, 754; Gino Marrocco, 681; Paul White, 438; Michael Bartholomew, 422 and John Simonsen, 315.

In Ward 2, Shane Cosburn led Rick Gamblen by 307 votes. Stephen McCarthy polled 738 and Vincent Dinelle, 645.

Bruce Howie was no match for Norah Stoner in Ward 3, trailing the incumbent 859 to 2,153.

Gains decisive victory

UXBRIDGE — Maustyn McKnight, considered by many as "mayor material", was re-elected to Regional Council, Monday, scoring a decisive victory over his only rival, Tim Harshaw. It was 2,277 for McKnight compared to 1,221 for Harshaw.

Elected to Council were - Mac Meyers, (Ward 2); Ron Johnson, (Ward 3); Sandy Ewen, (Ward 4) and Gerri-Lynn O'Connor (Ward 5). Mayor Gary Herrema and Ward 1 candidate, Don Jackson were both acclaimed.

Elected to Board of

Education were - Heather Beveridge and Brian Kennedy. All Separate School Trustees were acclaimed.

In Ward 2 it was Mac Keyers, 432 to 254 for Bert Shingler. In Ward 3, Ron Johnson defeated Norm Lyons, 426 to 335. Sandy Ewen downed Ian Morrison 582 to 365 in Ward 4 and Gerri-Lynn O'Connor was a solid favorite, polling 495 to 167 for Paul Harris and 99 for Bob Markell.

New trustees Heather Beveridge (1,494) and Brian Kennedy (1,195), were well out in front of also-rans, Ken Chevis, 923; Bruce Moran, 850 and Ruth Morrison, 827.

Speedy recovery

multiple compound fractures of both legs; a broken right arm and internal injuries. Mr. and Mrs. Baun left immediately for the West and visited Brian in Calgary General Hospital.

Reject sex guide

"Totally unacceptable"

DURHAM REGION — The Durham Region Separate School Board has firmly rejected a sex education guide for teachers, put out by the federal government.

Trustees' objections were contained in a letter sent to the Provincial Ministry of Education and Health. The booklet is being distributed by the Department of National Health and Welfare.

"The information is totally unacceptable to Catholics," said Linda Dionne, a board trustee.

Sex education, she said, within the Catholic system, must deal with the Christian concept of chastity and sexuality.

She called it "flippant", with very little moral value in its content.

Education Director Ed Finan said the Board and staff are well satisfied with the family life program already being carried out.

Although Mrs. Dionne said she favored the information on "childbirth", she described the rest as "a waste of time".

Booklet No. 1 deals with teaching sexuality, cultural factors and other affecting behavior. Booklet No. 2 deals with physiology, masturbation and homosexuality. Booklet No. 3 deals with family planning and the views of major religions in Canada on the subject, also teenage pregnancy, illegitimacy and infertility. Booklet No. 4 deals with birth controls currently available with reference to abortion as an effective means of birth control when conception takes place. Booklet No. 5 deals with venereal disease and the misuse of contraception. Booklet No. 6 deals with population growth.

Mrs. Dionne said she wasn't sure of the intent of Booklet 6 was to discourage having children or having sex.

The guide is available to all schools.

Recount

MARKHAM — There'll be a recount in Markham's Ward 6. Mike Larkin told The Tribune he'll make this request after losing out to incumbent, Councillor Elson Miles by only five votes.

Final figures showed 471 for Miles and 466 for Larkin.

Larkin, a late entry in the race, said he was pleased with the support received.

To 'crack down'

DURHAM REGION — During a period between 1976 and 1979, close to \$400,000 in regional water and sewer accounts went uncollected in Durham.

This year, the figure is expected to exceed \$120,000.

The Finance Department intends to 'crack down' on

delinquent bill-payers even though it may cost them \$29,000 to do it.

The region has been advertising, hoping to obtain a suitable person to fill the post. In the last two months they've checked through twenty applications but none has proved satisfactory.

Ruled insane

DURHAM REGION — Earlier this year, a motorist attempted to run down two Durham Region police officers.

Last week, Geraldo Alberastine, 35, appeared in Whitby Court and was found not guilty by reason of insanity. Judge J.P. Kelly ruled he be committed to the Mental Health

Unit at Penatanguishene for an indefinite period.

The accused admitted in a police statement that he wanted to run over Constables Marjorie Gibson and John McLean on the night of May 25.

The man, the court was told, had been admitted to the Whitby Psychiatric Hospital on three occasions in the last four years.
