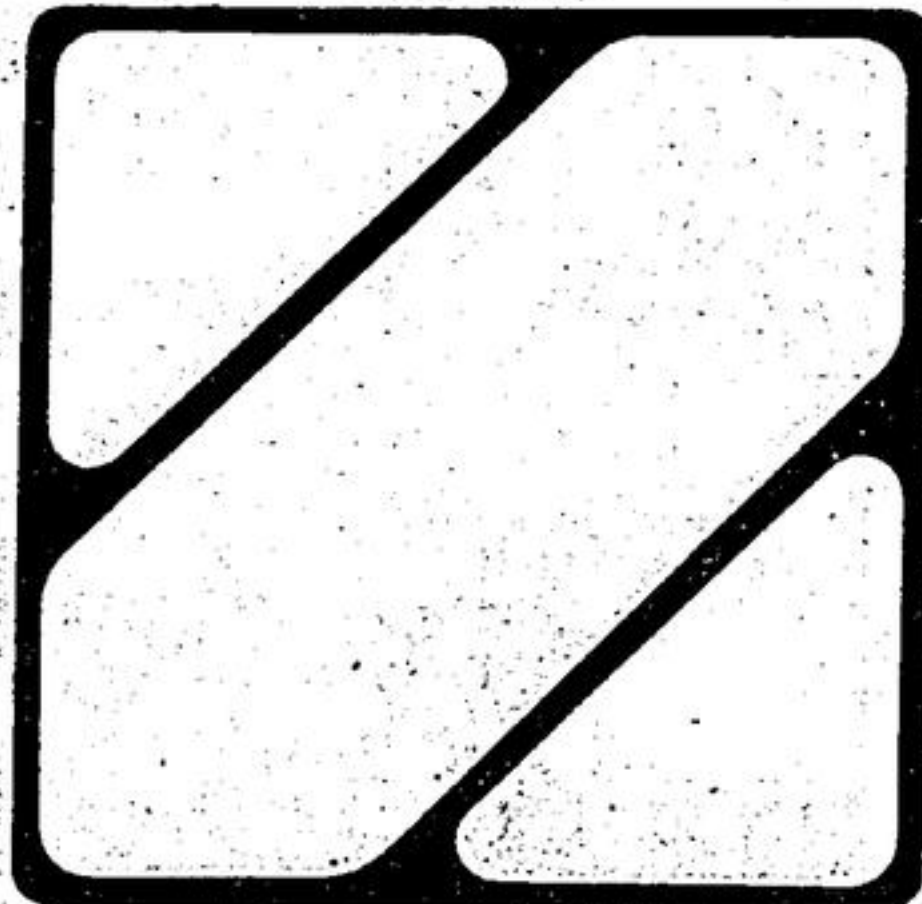
Congratulations to Gerald Fisher and Nora Stoner, returned as regional councillor and town councillor, respectively, in the recent municipal election.

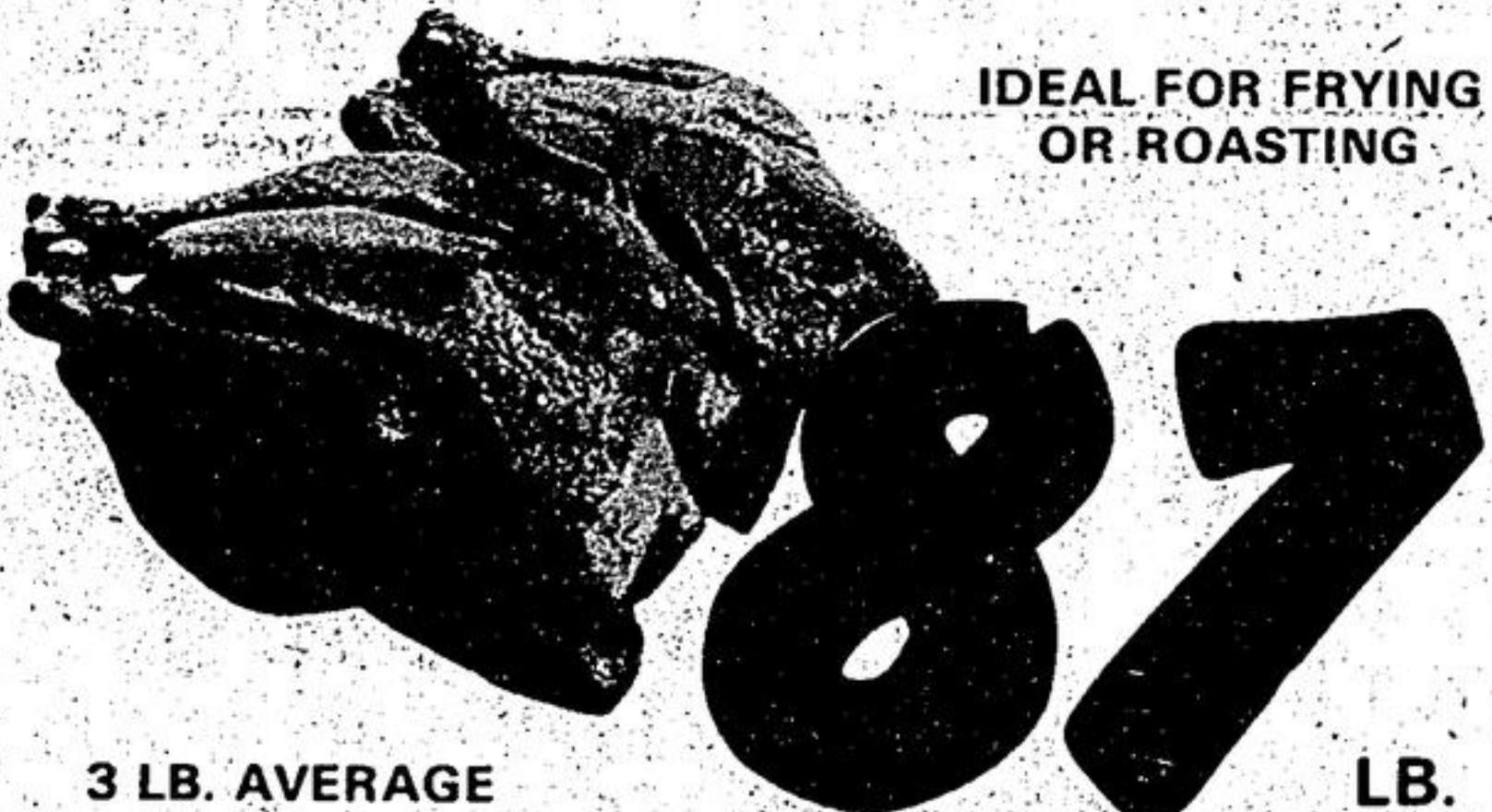
