

Approve quake aid

STOUFFVILLE Town Council has approved a donation of \$700 to the Italian Disaster Fund in the wake of the tragic earthquake that ravaged a part of that country.

The contribution moved by Councillor Bill Kamps and seconded by Councillor Becky Wedley, was approved at a year-end meeting, Nov. 25. Mayor Eldred King requested that either the Administrator or the Clerk make sure the money is properly channeled so that it reaches the intended source.
