Conservationists praised

STOUFFVILLE — A notice from South Lake Simcoe Conservation Club to Whitchurch-Stouffville Council that it would be presenting awards in various areas of conservation work, prompted a motion by Councillor Jim Doble that the Whitchurch-Stouffville Conservation Club be recommended for one.

Doble cited work done by members over the years in helping to maintain a healthy environment.

Club president, Kevin Oxberry, said the organization has been working mainly at the Stouffville reservoir and wildlife sanctuary, north of Edward Street.

The club hopes to do similar planting along the flood control channel, he said. Trees are purchased

from Metro Toronto Conservation Authority, at a "good price," Oxberry said.

A non-profit group, the club operates on a grant from the Town, and also from the money it makes selling hunting licenses. The franchise

was awarded the club through its program of releasing 500 pheasants throughout the township each fall.

Oxberry said the club would like to hear from area residents with ideas for conservation projects. Doble's motion was carried by council.

May soon solve traffic problem
