Delay hydro hike

STOUFFVILLE - While hydro rate increases are anticipated in most area municipalities next month, the Whitchurch-Stouffville Commission has postponed its rate hike until March 1, 1981.

The decision, Chairman Ken Laushway told The Tribune, followed a special meeting, at which time the cost of power, to be passed on to the consumer, came under close scrutiny.

As of the above date, the residential rate here will go up by an average of 8.4 per cent. This charge will extend over a ten-month period while the wholesale cost from Ontario Hydro is collectable for the full twelve months.

Careful budgeting and control of local operating costs were given as reasons why the local Commission has been able to reduce the total price impact at the customer level. The wholesale cost of power from

Ontario Hydro, beginning Jan. 1 is up by 9.5 per cent, Mr. Laushway said.

The rate hike of 8.4 per cent as of March 1, will mean a \$2.70 average increase per home per month, the chairman explained.

Increase

MARKHAM - As of Jan. 1, 1981, Markham's hydro rates will increase by 9.9 per cent (residential) and 10.4 per cent (industrial and commercial), Bob Dyer, Customer Service

Supervisor said this week. Although not official until approved by head office, Mr. Dyer indicated this should come through before the end of the

month. He stated also that Hydro patrons should anticipate rate hikes each year, matching the

inflationary spiral. "It looks like ten per cent from now to eternity," he said.
