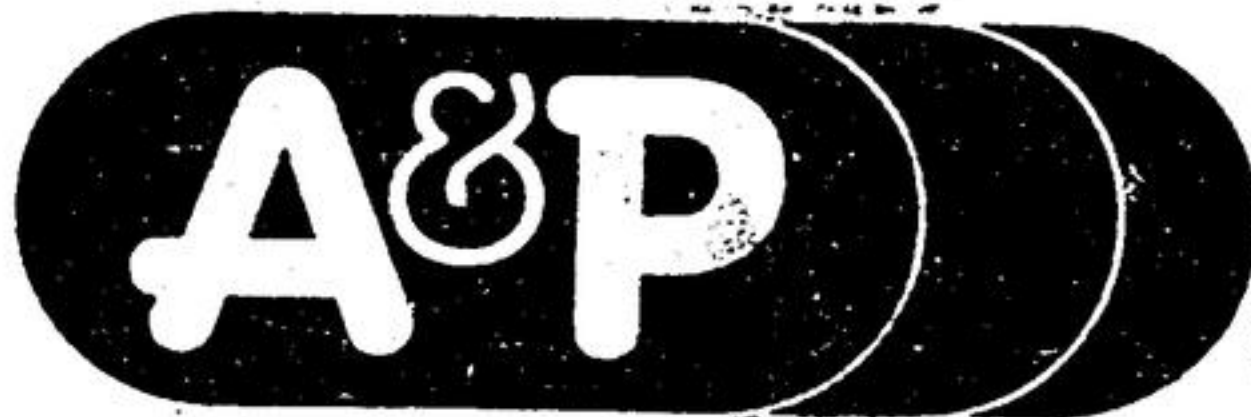

Joseph was a just man

Against the humble drama of that first Christmas in Bethlehem, the figure of Joseph and his experience of anguish, hardship and heroic devotion are often overlooked. But Joseph played an integral role in the Christmas story; he led Mary to Bethlehem, named the Child "Jesus" as the angel had told him and protected the mother and her Child from danger.

Scriptural accounts are scant on detail about Joseph, but he is referred to as a "just man" in Matthew's writings, and it is implied that he adhered scrupulously to Judaic and civil laws.

You can imagine his horror, then, when, after 3-month visit with her cousin Elizabeth, Mary returned to him, pregnant with a Child he had not sired.

Then, in the height of his desperation, an angel appeared to him in a dream with good news: "Fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Spirit. And she shall bring forth a Son, and thou shalt call His name Jesus: for He shall save His people from their sins."

At that moment, Joseph must have felt a little bewildered ... but immensely relieved. From then on, it seems that he trusted Mary wholeheartedly. Even when it was time for him to travel to Bethlehem for the census, he would not leave her. He brought Mary with him, despite the fact that it was a long journey — about eighty miles — and the time for her to give birth was drawing near.

Upon their arrival in Bethlehem, there was nothing but trouble. Think how disappointed Joseph must have been when he could not find a room for Mary to deliver her first Child. After hours and hours of searching, he managed to locate a stable, where she could at least have some privacy.

There, Mary gave birth to Jesus ... and both she and Joseph must have been overjoyed. Imagine Joseph's pride when he showed the Child to the shepherds, and his awe at the visit of the Magi, with their expensive gifts.

According to non-biblical accounts, Mary and Joseph remained happily in Bethlehem for about a year. But they were troubled by reports that the jealous King Herod was inquiring about their Son's identity and whereabouts.

An angel came to him in a dream again, saying: "Arise and take the young Child and His mother, and flee into Egypt and be thou there until I bring thee word: for Herod will seek the young Child to destroy Him."

Trusting the dream, Joseph obeyed unquestioningly and led Mary and the Child to Egypt.

In light of all these early events, it seems that Joseph must have been an extraordinary man — one who was not afraid of responsibility, who confronted problems head on, who was unflinchingly devoted to his family, and obedient to the will of God.

Board says no

UXBRIDGE — In an application to Uxbridge planning board last week, from Angelo Muscillo, vice-president of Goodwood Sand and Gravel, the board turned down a request for a land fill license.

Muscillo said he wanted to "rehabilitate by filling in the low land area with a dry waste, which contains no perishable garbage and consists mainly of brick rubble and other building waste."

He said the material had been recycled, removing steel and reusable metal.

Despite protests by Muscillo that he "wasn't interested in the garbage business," the board argued differently.

"There's always the fear these pits would become a garbage dump," said acting Mayor McKnight, summing up the board's feelings.
