**Frederick Robert Taylor
Came to Canada
at age of nine**

GOODWOOD — Frederick Robert Taylor of Goodwood came to Canada in 1911 at the age of nine, with his sister, Evelyn, as just one of 100,000 "waifs" transported here over a 20-year period. Mr. Taylor died last week in Scarborough Centenary Hospital.

"He never went back," his daughter, Joyce Graham, told The Tribune, "Even though he had a twin sister and a brother."

Mrs. Graham said her father had first been sent to a farm in Peterborough when he arrived. Then, after working on properties there and in the district until the age 14, he began driving a truck.

He and his family moved to Stouffville in 1954, living on Albert Street and later at Ringwood.

"Prior to that, we lived in quite a few places, including Zephyr and Leaskdale," Mrs. Graham said.

Mr. Taylor was predeceased by his wife, the former Vi Doig, and a brother, Jack.

He is survived by three daughters, Mrs. Graham, Eleanor Maskell, and Norma Fitzpatrick; three sons, Fred Jr., Daniel and Charles; two sisters, Evelyn, Thornhill, and Ada (Dunkey); 21 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren.

**Fire calls
set record**

STOUFFVILLE — The Stouffville Fire Department responded to a record 187 calls in 1980, Chief Walter Smith revealed this week, thirty more than in '79.

Structural and grass fires headed the list, numbering 35 each. Short-circuits and other causes in motor vehicles were next in line at 21.

The brigade answered alarms to 14 accidents and 13 chimney fires. The rescuator was required ten times. Faulty furnaces were responsible for six calls. Volunteers assisted at two rescues.

Thirty-three calls were listed under miscellaneous. There were twelve false alarms.

A full report on the year's activities will be presented to Town Council early in 1981.
