# Came to Canada at age of nine

GOODWOOD Frederick Robert Taylor of Goodwood came to Canada in 1911 at the age of nine, with his sister, Evelyn, as just one of 100,000 "waifs" transported here over a 20year-period. Mr. Taylor died last week in Scarborough Centenary

Hospital. "He never went back," his daughter, Joyce Graham, told The Tribune, "Even though he had a twin sister and a brother."

Mrs. Graham said her father had first been sent to a farm in Peterborough when he arrived. Then, after working on properties there and in the district until the age 14, he began driving a
