(2) Section 6 - Director, subsection 2 - Term of Office Strike Amendment passed at the Annual Meeting, January 1969: 'Should a Vice-President, on his year to step up to President, be finishing his term of office as a Director, he shall automatically be a Director for that year and only 5 Directors shall be elected at the Annual Meeting of that year.'

Proposed Amendment '18 Directors shall be elected - except that the President on completion of his year in office shall not be eligible for re-election for a period of three years.' Should a Vice-President on his/her year to step up to the next office be finishing his/her term as a Director, he/she will automatically become a Director for that year and only 4 or 5 Directors, as the case may be, shall be elected for a three (3) year term at the Annual Meeting of that year.' Junior Directors shall be age of 26 years.

Region 'family' games

The emphasis is on fun and family participation in the first ever York Regional Games which get underway next month. That was the message delivered by Richmond Hill Regional Councillor Gord Rowe at a special press conference at the region's administration office last Friday. The conference was held to publicize the winter portion of the games. Plans and preparations are still being formulated for the summer games. Mr. Rowe, who was representing Chairman Bob Forhan, said that \$15,000 has been earmarked by the region for the promotion of the games. The funds will also be used to purchase trophies which will be presented at the various events. The councillor, a member of the region's games committee, said that participation in the games is open to everyone. He said organized sports will not be promoted because the committee didn't want the games to conflict with organized sports such as hockey games. The idea of the games was first considered about a year and half ago as a method of stressing a strong regional identity. However plans for the games have been stepped up in the past few months. Mr. Rowe said the committee has held several meetings with the York Parks and Recreation Association, which is comprised of recreation personnel from the various York municipal recreation departments. As a result of those meetings a cross-country skiing competition, a dart tournament, a squash competition, basketball and volleyball tournaments, a snowmobile rally, and a eucyre tournament have been scheduled. DIRECTORS ATTEND Attending the conference with Mr. Rowe were the recreation directors from Newmarket, Vaughan, Richmond Hill, Georgina, and Markham. The various events will be held at key sites in these municipalities, partly because there is no one complex to accommodate all the events, Mr. Rowe said. However the councillor and the recreation directors suggested that holding the games in different areas will give York residents an opportunity to see a different part of the region. The games will be launched on Fri., Feb. 6 with a squash tournament in Markham and a eucyre tournament in Woodbridge. Brian Wrigglesworth, Markham recreation director, said the tournament will begin Friday night, and will continue on the Saturday. He said the competition will be open to players, in the novice category.

Going out of business

STOUFFVILLE - After five years in Stouffville, Ruvo's Ladies Wear, 21 Main West, is going out of business. "We gave it a good try," co-owner Ruth Whittemore, told The Tribune, "but the business isn't here". If anyplace, it's in the plazas, both she and her partner, Yvonne Lauder, said. Shoppers like the malls, despite higher prices and the less-than personal service. As a result, the two women are closing their shop and offering as much as 70 per cent off on some garments. "They're all current styles, too," said Ruth. "There's nothing here that wasn't bought for this season. Some of it came in just before Christmas." Despite their disappointment at having to give it up, the two partners emphasize that they don't want to leave sounding bitter. "We have a good clientele," Ruth said. "We're going to miss the people." "I love Stouffville," added Yvonne. Yvonne was a singer and performer in the great CBC-TV variety shows of the '50s and '60s while Ruth had 10 years in fashion, before the two got together and opened their store. Now that it's over? "Oh, we'll find work," Ruth said. "That's the way we were brought up - to work."

From Tribune files of thirty years ago

H.S. graduates honored

Kay Williamson was the valedictorian when Stouffville High School held its Commencement Exercises back in November, 1948 - thirty years ago. Murray Miller, president of the Literary Society, also spoke. Recipients of honor graduation diplomas were - Audrey Bell, Keith Clarke, Paul Cummings, Carl Grove, Betty Miller, Bill Nigh, Cour Noxon, Erline Paisley, Bert Stouffer, Rita Wagg, Kay Williamson, Ruth Windward and Carol Weldon. Athletic awards were presented to local field day champions - Marion Atkinson and Bill Collins, Junior; Marion Reid and Archie Forfar, Intermediate; Helen Goudie and Jack Wallace, Senior. Inter-school meet champions honored were - Helen Goudie, Murray Wagg and Marion Atkinson. A one-act play entitled "The Perfect Gentleman" was directed by Thos. Pherril. The cast included - Murray Pipher, Mary Grove, Loreen Talbot, Helen Goudie and Lloyd Free. A hydro blackout was scheduled for Stouffville but plans had to be altered due to an emergency operation at Brierbush Hospital. The Tribune reported that most homes in the village were prepared for the temporary accommodation was her nine year old daughter. The inspector was advised "to try and have the situation cleaned up as soon as possible". Stouffville Fire Chief Del Jennings warned officials of the United Church that the basement posed a fire hazard should the building be used as a nursery school. He said the doors opened the wrong way, and there was inadequate first aid equipment on hand and a shortage of fire extinguishers. Driving his Ford car in the area of Gravel Hill, Bruce Paisley ran into a horse-drawn 'vehicle' driven by Fred Connor. No one was hurt but 20 dozen eggs in the Connor buggy were smashed. The horse's harness was damaged. The horse was not injured. Henry Ogden, Stouffville's Massey-Harris dealer received an order for nine tractors, the largest ever handled by the local agency. Value of the sale was placed at \$10,000. The Claremont Creamery owned by Roy Olmstead and before that by Jos. Farr, was damaged by fire. Brigade units from Claremont and Brougham emptied their tanks on the blaze and also pumped several wells dry in an attempt to extinguish the flames. A barn owned by Brown and Keesor on Main Street, Stouffville was destroyed by fire. Several tons of hay were destroyed in the blaze. At the same time as firemen were attempting to extinguish this blaze, an unknown person took \$200 from the premises of Walter Atkinson next door. Ken Wagg, village jeweller and volunteer fireman, lost his wallet containing \$400. It was believed someone picked his pocket while he attended the fire scene. Ray Yake sold his 100 acre farm at lot 33, con- 9, Pickering, to Sam Fretz. The property had been in the Yake family name for 95 years being acquired by Ray's grandfather, the late Hiram Yake. Catherine Dyceman of Queensville was the first girl ever to participate in the North York Plowing Match. She placed 4th in the Stubble Class, 18 years and under. Harley Timbers of Unionville won the Eglinton Hunt Club Silver Trophy for the best plowed land and the Salada Tea Special that allows him to compete for the Company trip to England. The Allis-Chalmers Special was won by Dave Ratcliff of Stouffville. The senior plowman was Jim Lee of Greenbank and the youngest, Eugene Timbers of Milliken. Class winners were - Harley Timbers, Unionville; William Holden, Manilla; Bernard Wylie, Oakwood; Jack Dancy, Cannington; Eugene Timbers, Milliken; Bob Timbers, Stouffville; Les Smith, Gormley; Ed Ferguson, Stouffville; George Timbers, Stouffville; Jack Woods, Aurora. Blake Yake, dry-goods traveller, lost close to \$1,000 worth of goods when fire of unknown origin broke out in the home of his father, Austin Yake, south of Lemonville.
