Guest speaker

Raps "do your own thing"

STOUFFVILLE — The practice of "doing your own thing" may be common today, even popular. However, it's not supported by Howard Hunt, guest speaker at a men's breakfast, Saturday, in the Missionary Church.

The speaker described the "standing up for one's rights" as "one of the tragedies of the world". Far better, he suggested, if each of us would respect the other's rights. "We've got it backwards," he claimed. One's tongue, he stated, can get us into a lot of trouble. He quoted the slogan "before opening your mouth to start talking, make sure your brain's in gear". Instead of speaking without thinking, far better to bite our tongues, he said. The speaker urged his audience to live the Christian life as it is — full of joy and gladness. "Be a Christian that lives for God, 24 hours a day, seven days a week," he stressed.

We live in a day and age when there are no blacks and whites; no absolutes," he said, "the theory is permeating our whole society. Everyone does that which is right in his own eyes".

Not associated with any group, Mary Ann Imboden, 16, of RR 2, Uxbridge, said she was speaking on behalf of the International Year for the Disabled.

It's important that people realize the number of handicapped persons around — one in every 10 Canadians suffers a disability that prevents him from leading a normal life, she said.

The Thornhill resident, a member on the staff of the well-known engineering firm of Hisey and Barrington, said he firmly believes in rights and wrongs and likened "doing your own thing" to rebellion and rebellion to sin.

The speaker posed several questions including "how many had read through the Bible at least once. He noted that by completing three chapters a day, one could complete the entire Bible in a year. "Many of us are Biblical illiterate", he said.

Mr. Hunt also dwelt on the importance of prayer, the lack of which, is one of the failings of many churches, he said. He pointed to the fact that a church can be filled for a Sunday service, yet less than one-third will attend a prayer meeting.

Miss Imboden said all these people need, and want a chance to work and play the same as others. Wherever they go, however, they face social stigmas, as well as such physical problems of manoeuvring wheel chairs down narrow halls. She said Scarborough

had recently had an "Awareness Week," and was now proposing an "Awareness Month." She's hoping council will recognize the Year of the Disabled in some way. Miss Imboden told The Tribune she had become interested in the plight of the disabled after meeting Beryl Potter, chairman of Awareness Week, in a shopping mall in Scarborough. Her presentation was received with thanks.
