WHITCHURCH — A buyer from Richmond, Ont., near Ottawa, purchased close to \$50,000 worth of equipment, last week, at Hutchinson's annual farm machinery sale, RR 2, Stouffville. George Crawford loaded the units onto a tractor-trailer for delivery to the Maritimes and Maine. The largest tractor in the auction, a John Deere 6030 brought \$19,500. Brand new, it would sell for close to \$50,000, auctioneer Lloyd Wilson told The Tribune. An Allis-Chalmers 200 sold for \$12,000. An International combine brought a top bid of \$37,000. Another combine sold for \$23,000 with two more going for \$12,000 each. Corn planters brought up to \$6,600 and a New-Holland forage harvester sold for \$5,000. Balers went as high as \$1,500. "Square balers are on the way out and round balers are coming in," Wilson stated. The latter, he explained, reduce labor costs.

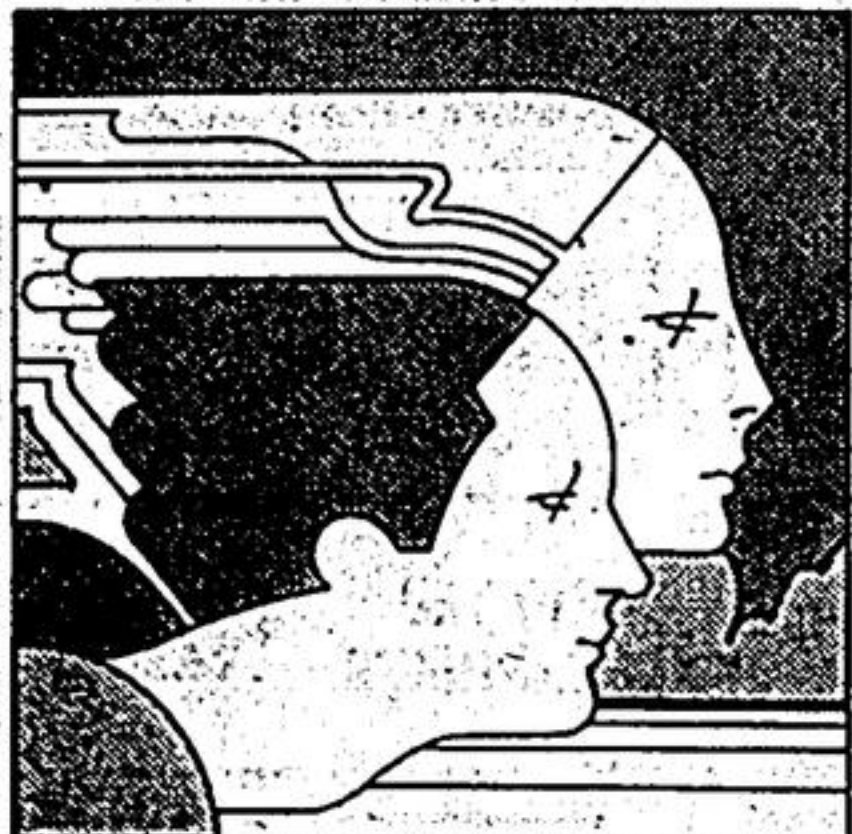

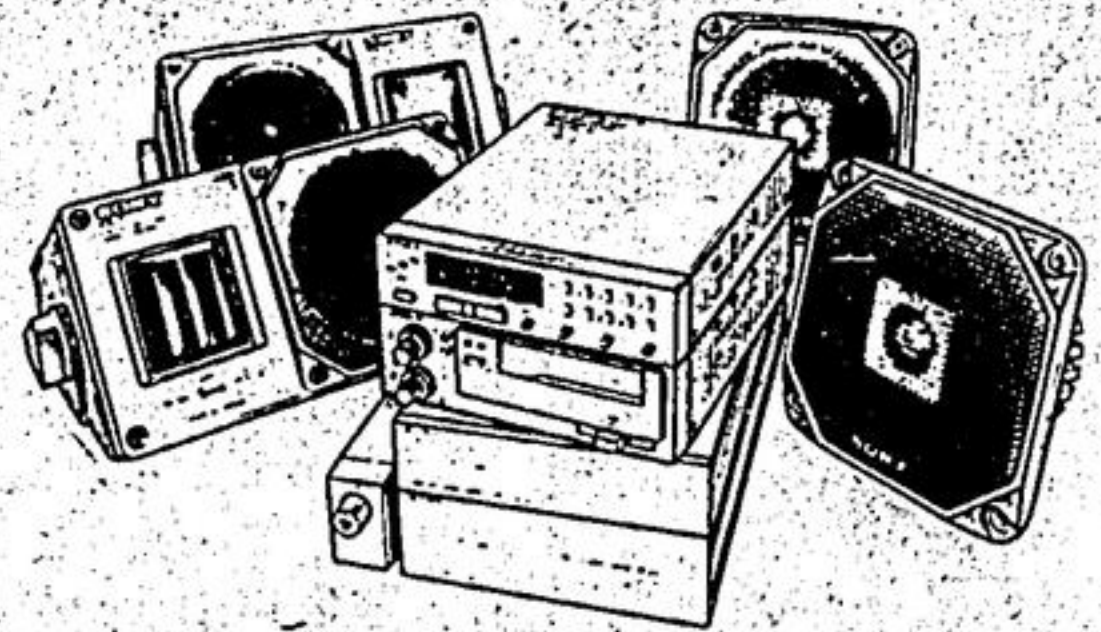
