Prior to the Tom Sawyer-Huck Finn pantomime, Katherine Woodhead performed a breath-taking solo. She thrilled the audience with her spins and turns. Pro Kevin Robertson brought squeals of delight from ringside teens.

The second half entitled "Miss Piggy Visits Caravan" was an all-color show-pretty girls in beautiful costumes, a combination that's hard to beat.

Cheryl Simpson as the Mexican bullfighter was brilliant. A comedy highlight was the dual performance of Lynda Butler and Elizabeth Gibb as the bull. The Mexican dancers, followed by the Kalinka and Sabre dancers, introduced color schemes unlike anything seen here before. Ruth Thorne as the Bavarian Miss showed promise of a professional in the making.

The cost and the work involved is too great, she said following last weekends performances. Stressing that the opinion was hers and not necessarily that of the executive, she said a meeting of the committee would be held shortly to plan for the future.

Expressing some disappointment in the size of crowds, Friday and Saturday nights, Jean pointed to competition on several fronts including the carnival at Unionville, the Midget finals in Windsor and the

N.H.L. playoffs on T.V., as definite factors.

As for the carnival itself, she described it as "one of the best". This was due in part, she said, to the way most of the skaters had matured over the past two years.

While hesitant to touch on individuals, she praised the performance of soloist Cindy Wilson and staff pro Kevin Robertson. Kevin skated in the show at Unionville as well as Stouffville.
