**"Reach out" - pastor**

**STOUFFVILLE** — "There are more heartaches around us than evidenced by a wheelchair, a crutch or a white cane," said Rev. Leslie Tarr, guest speaker at the annual Canada Week community service in the Stouffville Park, Sunday.

"People with problems are everywhere, even across the table in our own homes."

Unfortunately, he stated, the predominant philosophy of most people is "get all I can as fast as I can whatever the cost."

Success, he said, seems to be the ultimate goal, along with the financial return that goes with it. Better, he said, if more of us were like Terry Fox — not looking out for No. 1.

Rather than the "rags to riches" stories so often proclaimed, the Bible tells the other side — "riches to rags," the speaker continued. With Jesus, he said, it wasn't

"what's in it for me, but what can I do for others."

In spite of threatening weather, the worship was largely attended. Ministers taking part included Rev. Ted Green, St. James Presbyterian; Rev. Chris Sorley, Bloomington Christian Gospel; Rev. **New Manor soon complete**

**BLOOMINGTON** — It was just three years ago that plans were made to expand Green Gables Manor at Bloomington, and only nine months ago that work was started on the building, itself. Now, the project is nearing completion.

"It's just a matter of the floors," says owner Dmytro Haluszka, as he described the new addition of his senior citizens' home, enlarged from 5,000 to 16,000 square feet.

Not that the floors aren't already in, but there's considerable covering to be done, and Mr. Haluszka estimates it will be another week before this is finished.

Construction of the two-floor, brick and cement structure, connected to the present frame building by a covered corridor, began last September. It is completely self-contained, in all ways, with everything from its own tuck shop, beauty salon and chapel, to complete fire-proofing and fire detection equipment throughout.

One floor is for patients only, and the other is for service rooms, something the original edifice lacked. Also, it only contained a ward and semi-private rooms; the new one has both plus two private ones. All 14 rooms are of different colors.

An outdoor patio, craft and physiotherapy rooms, and lounges for both patients and staff, are other features.

Parking in the back will accommodate 35 vehicles.

The 36 people in the present home will be transferred to the new dwelling, and their old residence will then be renovated to house more residents.

Mr. Haluszka said Green Gables grows most of its own vegetables, and provides all its own eggs and poultry.

A staff of 35 most of them part time, work three shifts, seven days a week.

Mr. Haluszka is planning a special ceremony to mark the opening.
