Orchard Park School Computer age

STOUFFVILLE — We're in a computer age and the age of the computer user can be as young as six. Stouffville's Orchard Park School is a prime example. There are three optional units there, part of a pilot project in a \$100,000 program supported by York County Board of Education. The units cost about \$3,000 each.

Children from Grades 1 through 7 are using them, Principal John Hincks told a parents' meeting at Orchard Park, Thursday. The teacher in charge is Ron Robbins.

In addition to their operation during regular school hours, a Computer Club has been organized involving mainly students in Grades 5, 6 and 7. This group meets at noon hours and following dismissal in the afternoon. The benefits will be evaluated at the end of the school year, Mr. Hincks said.

Mr. Robbins described the interest as "fantastic". "They're greatly motivated," he said, "It's amazing to see what some of the students have done." Mr. Robbins described the machines as "in-

finetly patient". As funds permit, more and more schools will be obtaining them, the principal stated, with the ultimate being one computer per classroom.

Trustee Harry Bowes said computer programs are approved by the Ministry with 70 per cent funding anticipated in 1982.

Mr. Hincks expressed satisfaction with the positive attitudes shown by students to date. He requested feedback from parents on comments by children within the home.
