BALLANTRAE — The sudden passing of William (Bob) Over, Oct. 25, shocked and saddened the Ballantrae community where he'd been a resident 42 years.

Mr. Over, 72, had gone for a walk down to "The Marsh" to check a few of his traps. When he failed to return, his wife went looking for him without success. Later, with the assistance of friends, they made the discovery. He'd been dead about two hours, the coroner said.

Born in England, Mr. Over came to Canada in 1924. A skilled carpenter, he built many homes in the Ballantrae area. Later, he joined the firm of Markham Sand & Gravel, working at the asphalt plant. More recently, with extra time available, he busied himself in his garden.

Besides his wife, the former Lillian Nesbitt, he is survived by one son Gordon of Peterborough; three grandsons, Christopher,

Jeffery and Jason and one sister, Betty Rogers in England.

Tuesday, November 17th, 1981 at 7:30 p.m. in the Municipal Building, 19 Civic Avenue, Stouffville

A public meeting will be held by the Planning Committee of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to present and discuss the following proposed Official Plan Amendment:

Amendment No. 3 to the Official Plan of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville planning area which changes the land use designation from "RURAL" to "RECREATIONAL COMMERCIAL" (including "ESTATE RESIDENTIAL") on the east part of LOT 8, CON-CESSION 9.

The subject site has frontage on Highway No. 47 immediately north of the Steeple Hollow Golf Course. The proposed Amendment is a result of an application to permit an integrated Estate Residential (33 lots) and Golf Course development.

You are invited to attend the meeting and to state your support or objection to the proposed amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting.
