Eleventh championship win SDSS do it again

STOUFFVILLE — Twelve consecutive games. St. Roberts lost only one of their games prior to the final. It was the fifth year in succession that St. Roberts faced Stouffville in the York County finals and lost out.

In the semi-finals round, Stouffville defeated Richmond Hill 15-5 and 15-6, and St. Roberts downed Sutton 15-4 and 15-2.

It was the setting of Mike Rehili, combined with the power hitting of David Wright, Doug Davidson, Steve Johns, Trevor Young and Ross Dube that gave the Spartans victory.

Although St. Roberts produced a fine string of victories to reach the final, it was the tough blocking and back-court speed of the Spartans that beat them. The deep bench of Don Wideman, Claude Maillet and Marek Kaczynski allowed coach Rehili to rest his front line troops during the long day of tournament; resulting in a fresh team for the final assault on the title.

Stouffville has again performed well in volleyball tournaments this year. In September they reached the semi-finals at the Laurentian University tournament, losing out to North Bay; the Dumbarton tournament on October 10; and the Pickering tournament on October 17, reaching the Consolation finals against Victoria Park Collegiate.

Tough competition is expected in this year's Georgian Bay championships. Teams from Collingwood, Parry Sound, St. Roberts, and the top favourites from St. Theresa, in Midland, will test the Spartans to their utmost.

French Language Advisory Committee for Secondary Schools

A meeting has been called for Wednesday, November 18, 1981 at 8:00 p.m. in the Resource Centre of Huron Heights Secondary School, 40 Huron Heights Drive, (off Davis Drive) Newmarket.

The purpose of the meeting is to elect six French-speaking ratepayers to serve on the French Language Advisory Committee of The York County Board of Education for the 1981-82 school year. The Advisory Committee shall make recommendations to the School Board with respect to ways and means of meeting the educational and cultural needs of French-speaking pupils in York Region. Eligibility to serve on this committee is restricted to those French-speaking ratepayers who have the qualifications required but are not members of the Board of Education as outlined in The Education Act 1974, namely:

192 (1) A person is qualified to be elected as a member of a board if he is,

(a) a Canadian citizen;

(b) of the full age of eighteen years;

(c) a resident within the area of jurisdiction of the board; and

(d) in the case of:

(i) a public school board, a public school elector,

(ii) a Roman Catholic separate school board, a separate school elector,

(iii) a member of a board of education to be elected by public school electors, a public school elector, and

(iv) a member of a board of education to be elected by separate school electors, a separate school elector.

HERE'S HOW TO SAVE BIG DOLLARS WHEN YOU BUY BIG ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES

LOOK FOR THE ENERGUIDE LABEL

When you buy a major electrical appliance, you're picking up two price tags. One is the cost of the appliance. The other is the cost of the electricity to operate it over its lifetime.

Until recently the energy price tag was missing. You paid now—but had little idea of what you would go on paying. Now there's a second tag, in the form of an Energuide label.

Over a 15-year lifetime Model A, although slightly larger, would cost you \$842.40 for energy (at a constant 4¢/kWh). Model B's energy cost would be \$1,368.00. That's a difference of \$525.60!

WHAT IS ENERGUIDE?

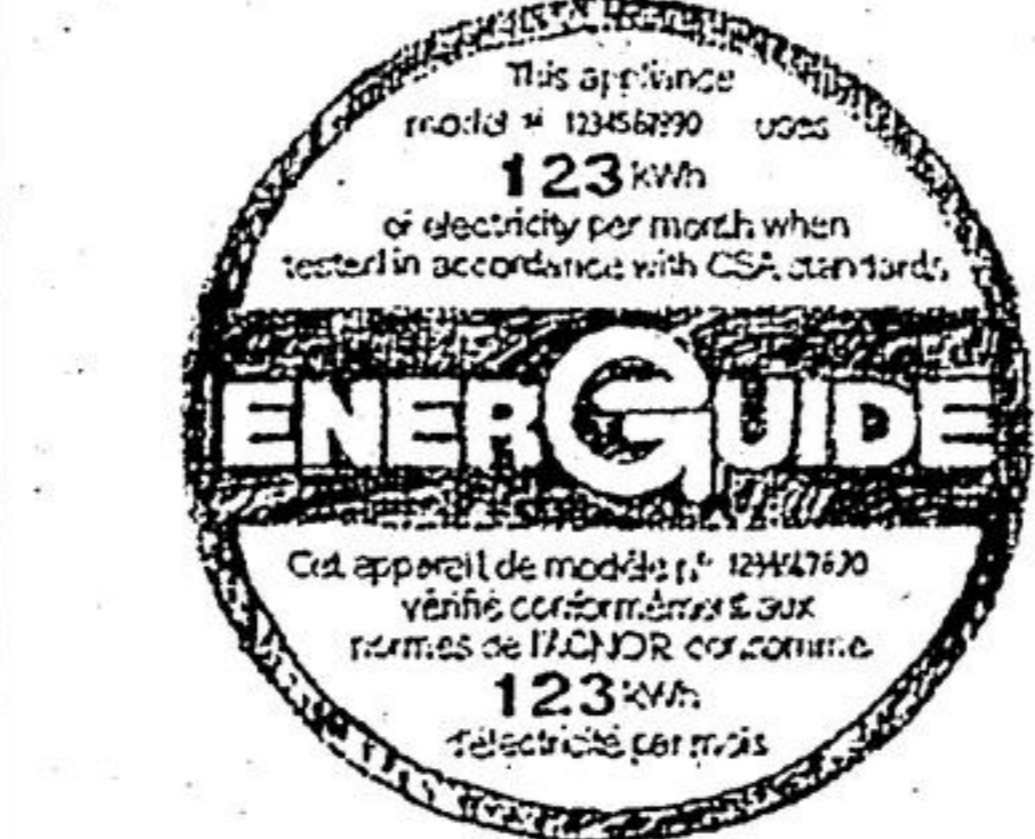
Energuide is an appliance labeling program under which energy consumption "stickers" are attached to new refrigerators, freezers, dishwashers, clothes washers, and kitchen ranges offered for sale in Canada. The program was initiated by the Government of Canada and is operated in co-operation with consumer groups, appliance manufacturers and retailers, electrical utilities and provincial governments.

COMPARISON SHOPPING

The whole idea behind Energuide is to help you, the consumer, to compare the energy cost tags of appliances and determine which is the best buy. Comparison shopping and wise decisions can save you a great deal of energy and money over the long run.

HOW DOES ENERGUIDE WORK?

The label on each new appliance shows the number of kilowatt hours of electricity (kWh) consumed by that appliance in one month of normal operation. This rating is determined by a test developed by the Canadian Standards Association for all appliances labelled. The number is representative of the energy that the appliance will consume under normal operation in your home. It's not exact; the test could never duplicate precisely all the conditions in your home. But it is correct as a comparative rating, to indicate the difference between models.



AN ENERGUIDE BONUS FOR ALL

Besides providing consumers with information for comparison shopping, the Energuide program is having another effect. Appliance manufacturers are improving the energy efficiency of their models. Already there have been some notable improvements and experts predict that within a few years major appliances will be consuming about 40% less electricity—while providing the same services. That's a powerful example of how consumer power and industrial innovation go hand in hand.

WORK OUT THE LIFETIME COST

To really appreciate the importance of Energuide ratings, figure out the lifetime energy cost of the appliance. The average major appliance lasts 15 years, or 180 months.

Multiply the cost per month by 180 and the number you get will be impressive. And it will be an underestimate, because it assumes a constant electricity price over 15 years.
