"Stouffville Singles Association"

Singles club going strong

STOUFFVILLE — If you're single and looking for something to do in your spare time, then the Stouffville Singles Association could be just for you.

The club has been in operation since last March and has been very successful to date. Originally formed with just 10 members, the group now has a membership of 50.

Joanne Beach, the unofficial social coordinator for the association, says the club was formed to

provide activities for single people, being separated, divorced, widowed or just single.

"We found there was a need for this type of club," she said. "Everything in the Stouffville area seems to be couple-orientated."

She noted that there is also plenty for seniors and teens to do, but this group of people (singles) was often left out.

One of the problems that Joanne pointed out was that many people

think the group is for single parents, which just isn't the case. The group is for all singles, with or without children.

"Our aim is to give single people something to do with their spare time and to enjoy themselves socially," said Joanne.

She also stressed the group is not a dating club. "Many people are hesitant to join because they think we're a dating service, which we are not," she said. "We're a social club.

I'm sure there are a lot of single people in Stouffville that would really enjoy the group."

The idea for the club originally came about through the Family Life Centre in Stouffville. Joanne, a volunteer at the Centre, took on the task of forming the group. Of the original 10 members, five are still with the association.

Activities that the group has participated in during the past year include dances, dinner theatres, movies and bowling.

"We try to arrange one or two events every week," said Joanne, "with most of our activities being held in York Region to keep down on travelling expenses."

The group usually meets in Stouffville and then car pools it from there.

A meeting is held every month in which new or coming events are discussed. "We really have a friendly group," said Joanne, "considering all the different backgrounds and occupations."

club ranges from 25-55, with members coming from as far away as Scarborough. "We have no strict guidelines as to age," said Joanne.

She also added that the group will be holding a formal election this month to decide official titles. "We're getting big enough now that we have to have a little more direction from specific people," she said.

Consumers' Gas New way to collect

STOUFFVILLE — The introduction of a "Third Party Notification Program" by Consumers' Gas to help it catch up with delinquent customers, has drawn mixed reaction from Town Council.

"I think it's terrible when they bring in third parties to help them collect. It's sick," said Councillor Bill Kamps.

The purpose is to help consumers' credit department resolve numerous difficult collection situations in a manner which avoids undue hardship to the families involved.

Sending disconnection notices to its customers is not "a pleasant task," and it hopes to find "a procedure that might help some of our customers" the letter read.

Under the plan, all arrears "notices" would be sent to the customer. However, prior to terminating service,

"every effort" would be made to contact a designated "Third Party" — any consenting individual.

The third party is under no obligation to pay, "but this contact will give them ample time to find out what action needs to be taken on behalf of the customer, so that the service can be maintained," the company said.

"Perhaps Consumers' Gas should set up its own social service committee," said Mayor Eldred King.

Said Councillor Will Morley: "If it keeps someone from going without heat, I'm all for it."

Councillor Charles Warden said he didn't take any "exception to it." Many people are unaware there are social service agencies to help them.

"Maybe the municipality can help, too. That's why it's directed to us," he said.

Main concern is planning

MUSS LAKE — "Good planning," not expansion, was the main concern of an area resident when he appeared before Planning Board last week.

Henry Malec, owner of property on Balsam Avenue adjacent to Cedar Beach Trailer Park, told Council he thought the park had, "for some reason been allowed to proceed without public scrutiny."

Council recently gave approval to the park to expand by 100 trailer units.

Malec said he didn't disapprove "but I asked the proper planner to peruse a buffer between the trailer park and the subdivision."

Said Councillor Tom Wood: "I don't know how big a buffer you want." He pointed out that there were three hedges and a six-foot

chain fence there now; also mature trees.

His cottage is 85 feet back from the fence and a trailer would be 400 feet away "at the closest," Wood said.

Malec said he and his father owned two building lots nearby and someday he might build a house there. The latter would be three feet from the fence, and a road would be 19 feet from his bedroom. Such a distance would be 40 feet in most subdivisions.

"This is madness," he said.

"We haven't done anything that the zoning wouldn't permit," said Mayor Eldred King.

Malec said he wasn't against expansion, but wanted to see that, "any residence now be submitted to the proper planner."

Council agreed to look into the matter.
