

Clippers leave it late Last minute win

STOUFFVILLE — A third period hat trick by defenceman Al Wedell saved the A & S Construction Clippers from what looked like certain defeat in their home game against Lakefield on Saturday evening.

If Lakefield went away disappointed with the result, they had good cause. Having dominated play for the first two periods, and leading 5-2 going into the final frame, their nemesis appeared in the form of Wedell who deserted his defensive role for that of offense.

Opening the scoring, Lakefield led 2-0 up until the closing seconds of the first period before Mark Kernohan, from Bruce Rugelis and Jim Chilvers, managed to get the Clippers on the board.

Three more goals in the second period had the Clippers trailing 5-2. Wedell hammered in his first of four goals, on Kernohan's assist, keeping the Clippers within reach.

Wedell turned the tide in the Clippers' favour in the first three minutes of play in the

final frame. Two quick goals at the 19 and 17 minute mark, on assists from Joe Twinney, the second from Lorne Potter and Rugelis, made all the difference.

Potter tied it at 5-5 with a power play goal at the halfway mark, assists to Twinney and Rugelis, while Wedell put the Clippers ahead with just over two minutes left in the game.

Barry Greenfields closed out the game on Rob Gierkink's assist, seconds later to make it 7-5.
