On a couple of occasions our street has been a veritable 'skating rink' at 6 a.m., and yet the main roads are fine.

Hazardous conditions may occur only a half-dozen times each winter. In my opinion, the road department

should arrange its work schedule to meet such emergencies and not carry on like it's the middle of July.

I'm not asking town employees to work round-the-clock. What I'm suggesting is that they work when there's work to be done. That can be 5 a.m. or 5 p.m. The weatherman pays no union dues.
