**BALLANTRAE** — In preparing to set up a fire department in the Ballantrae-Musselman's Lake area, the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville is accepting applications for additional volunteers.

He explained, that although an auxiliary brigade will not become a reality until late 1982 or early 1983, it takes
