

Recreation budget requests down

Requests for Town funds, to assist the various recreation organizations in Whitchurch-Stouffville for 1982, totals \$85,230.00. This is \$293 less than last year. However, still to be heard from are the Whitchurch-Stouffville Concert Band and the Youth Bowling League. They had no representatives present at the Recreation Committee's budget night meetings, Feb. 10 and 11.

Despite rising costs, several groups are holding the line on expenditures. They're

doing this by dipping into reserve funds, the meeting was told.

In 1981, the Stouffville Soccer Club ended up with a deficit of \$300. But officials did not ask for money to offset the loss.

The largest requested increase is for Minor Hockey — \$10,832. Seven thousand dollars of this is required to cover a hike in the hourly ice-rental rate.

With no Junior or Midget men's softball teams this year, all-star softball is down \$300 from the 1981 figure of \$2,923.

The Soccer Club's request remains at \$1,500, while Girls' Hockey is up by \$500 to \$4,000.

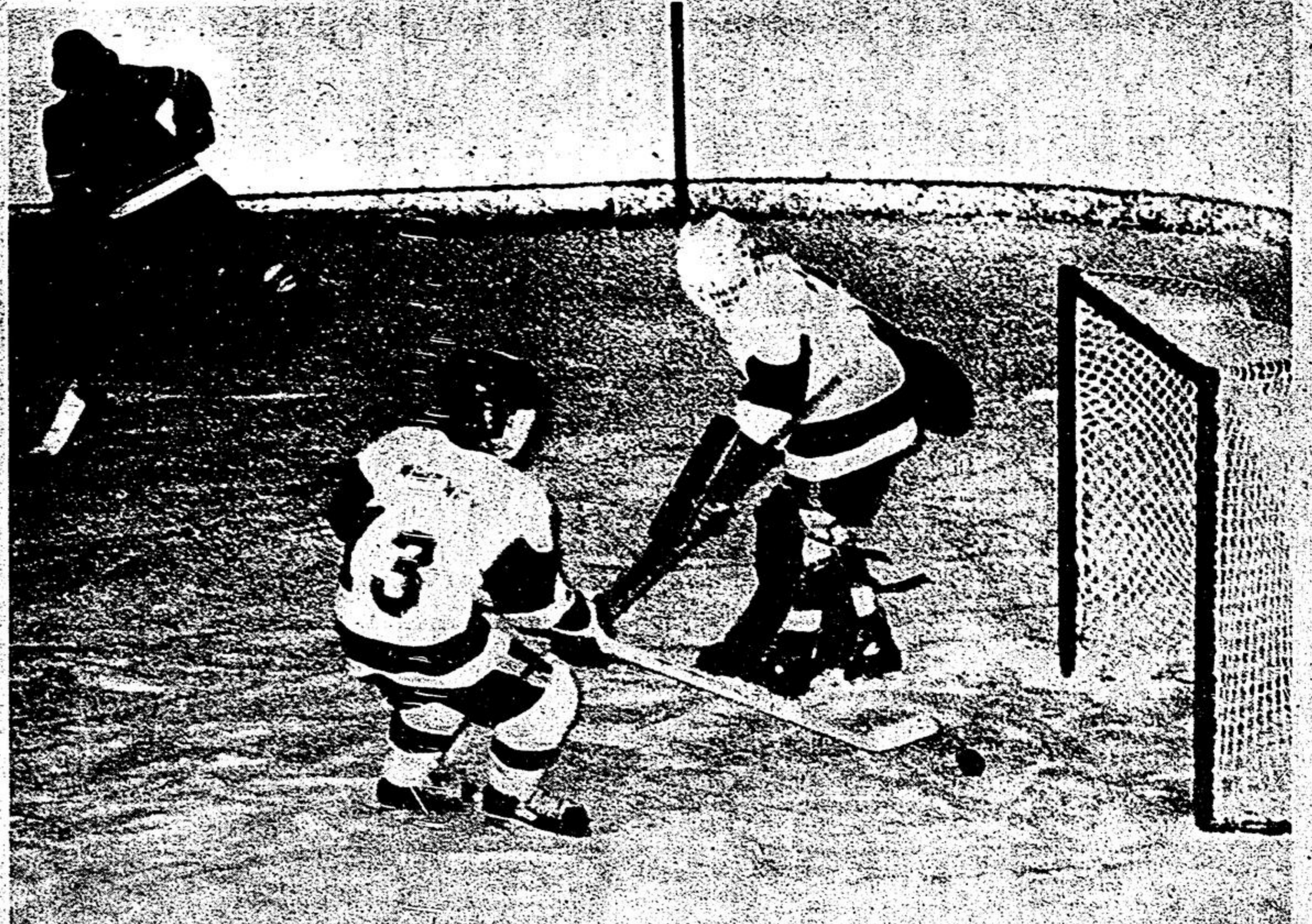
New to the meeting this year was the Ballantrae Tennis Club. During the past two seasons, it has operated without assistance. Their request was for \$2,000 to retain the service of a summer instructor.

Minor Softball is down by \$135 to \$1,509. The Figure Skating Club asked \$600 more. The Rugby Club asked no financial assistance.

The Stouffville Branch of Seneca College will supervise both the tennis and playground programs. They're expected to be self-supporting. Co-ordinator, Gayle Atkinson, said, Seneca would not involve itself in any program that was not cost-recoverable.

The Ballantrae Playground Program will be administered by the Town but supervised by Seneca. The program for handicapped children will again be held at the Ballantrae Community Centre this summer.

The Rugby Club is not requesting budgetary help in 1982.
