### INTERIM TAXES

1st Instalment due - March 19th, 1982  
2nd Instalment due - June 18th, 1982  
Interim tax bills have now been mailed. Ratepayers who have not received their bills should make immediate application to the Municipal Tax Department.

The PENALTY charged for non payment of 1982 taxes is one and one-half (1½) per cent imposed on the first day of the first month immediately following the instalment due date and on the first day of each month thereafter.

Failure to receive a tax bill does not eliminate the responsibility for payment of taxes nor the penalty charges for late payment.
