Detained in Argentina

STOUFFVILLE — Nineteen year old Cynthia Bart, a virtual "prisoner" within her native Argentina, is back in Stouffville, much to the relief of her parents, Jack and Margaret Bart, Rupert Avenue.

Cynthia had returned to the land of her birth five weeks ago, wanting to attend a Youth Camp in an area where her

mother and father had served as missionaries. She also wanted to visit the several churches established by her parents there.

However, when the time came for her to leave, immigration officials wouldn't let her go and no amount of persuasion would change their minds.

On the advice of her parents, she went to the

Canadian Embassy and told them her story. They arranged an appointment with a lawyer who escorted through customs and onto a plane.

Since Cynthia wasn't listed as a passenger, Mr. and Mrs. Bart didn't know of her whereabouts until contact was made with Eastern Airlines in Florida. Officials there assured them their daughter was on board a flight headed for

Toronto. She arrived at Malton Friday afternoon.

"We were overjoyed," Mrs. Bart told The Tribune, "the whole family went to meet her."

In spite of all the problems, Cynthia still loves Argentina and the people there; so much so, she may go back again. Next time, she intends to make sure that getting out is as easy as getting in.

GO-train service to begin Sept. 7

STOUFFVILLE — GO-train service between Stouffville and Toronto, replacing the present VIA-Rail system, will commence Tuesday, Sept. 7. York-Centre M.P.P. Don Cousens told The Tribune, "It'll be no 'mickey mouse' operation either, he said, in fact close to \$2,000,000 will be spent in upgrading the facility.

Modern passenger coaches will be placed on this line and standardized GO-stations will be established in each community. Parking areas will also be improved, Cousens said.

"The highest standard of safety and service will be provided," stated the York-Centre Member, "this is no casual thing."

Cost to the commuter will be reduced, Cousens explained.

Cousens said the govern-

ment had made no commitment with regard to extending the service to Uxbridge. He noted too that the run between Toronto and Havelock would be cancelled.

The area Member said that at no time did he consider GO-buses an advisable alternative.

He pointed out that with roads into Toronto now crowded, with parking at a premium and gasoline costs on the increase, the train is the only viable solution.

For the present, one train per day is planned. This will increase to two when ridership warrants, Cousens said.

The M.P.P. praised the "hand-in-glove" co-operation between all persons connected with the service. "One can obtain a lot more with sugar and honey than with vinegar," he concluded.

Also elated by the news is York Regional Chairman Bob Forhan. "The decision looks well for the future," he said, pointing to the fact that the new GO-service can be expanded, "something that would have been impossible under the VIA system."

MARKHAM — Markville Centre, a multi-million dollar shopping complex at Hwy. 7 and McCowan Road, will greet thousands of first-time visitors when it opens its door to the public on Wednesday (to-day).

There are 140 stores in the mall including Eaton's, Woolco, Miracle Food Mart, Shoppers Drug Mart, Jack

On Tuesday evening, a gala pre-opening party was attended by Ontario Premier Wm. Davis and close to 4,000 invited guests. Mr. Davis cut a huge cake, made in the shape of the mall. The public opening, Wednesday at 9 a.m., was presided over by Markham Mayor Tony Roman. This was followed by a ceremony at 9:30 in the new Eaton's store.

Blow-up predictable

STOUFFVILLE — Reported dissension within the ranks of the Concerned Citizens' Committee, came as no surprise to Town Mayor Eldred King. "I could see it coming," he told The Tribune.

He said the group had worked independent of Council and as mayor had not attended any meetings.

He suggested that because

the organization may have been misled by certain people, its credibility at the Ministry level had been weakened.

The mayor pointed out, however, that the situation as far as the municipality is concerned, is not changed — that the Ministry's monitoring program wasn't broad enough.

As for Fran Sainsbury's involvement on behalf of the

Town, Mayor King produced a motion dated June 11, 1981 that read: "Be it resolved that Dr. John Hodgkinson, Associate Medical Officer of Health, Regional Municipality of York, be requested that Mrs. Fran Sainsbury be appointed as the representative for the residents of Whitchurch-Stouffville to deal with any matters relative to the proposed medical survey to be undertaken in the Town".
