

# Bulk fertilizer plant Re-study application

STOUFFVILLE — Town Council, last week, agreed to have another look at a rezoning application for a fertilizer bulk blending plant in Cedar Valley, to which it had given approval a couple of weeks before.

The about-face came after a group of area residents, headed by Tom Marshall, complained that many of the people whose names appeared on a 30-name petition presented to Council, favoring the re-zoning, had been misled.

"That's one bell of a petition on which to base an application," he said.

In his application earlier, Don Hindson, appearing for United Co-operatives of Ontario, operators of the plant, said the present property (owned by John Bosworth Ltd.) was being used as a legal non-conforming use, and the requested change would make it a "valid and conforming use under the by-laws of the municipality."

tended to restore some fire-damaged buildings to their original size for storage.

Hindson said the plant was a part of maintaining the desired agricultural base.

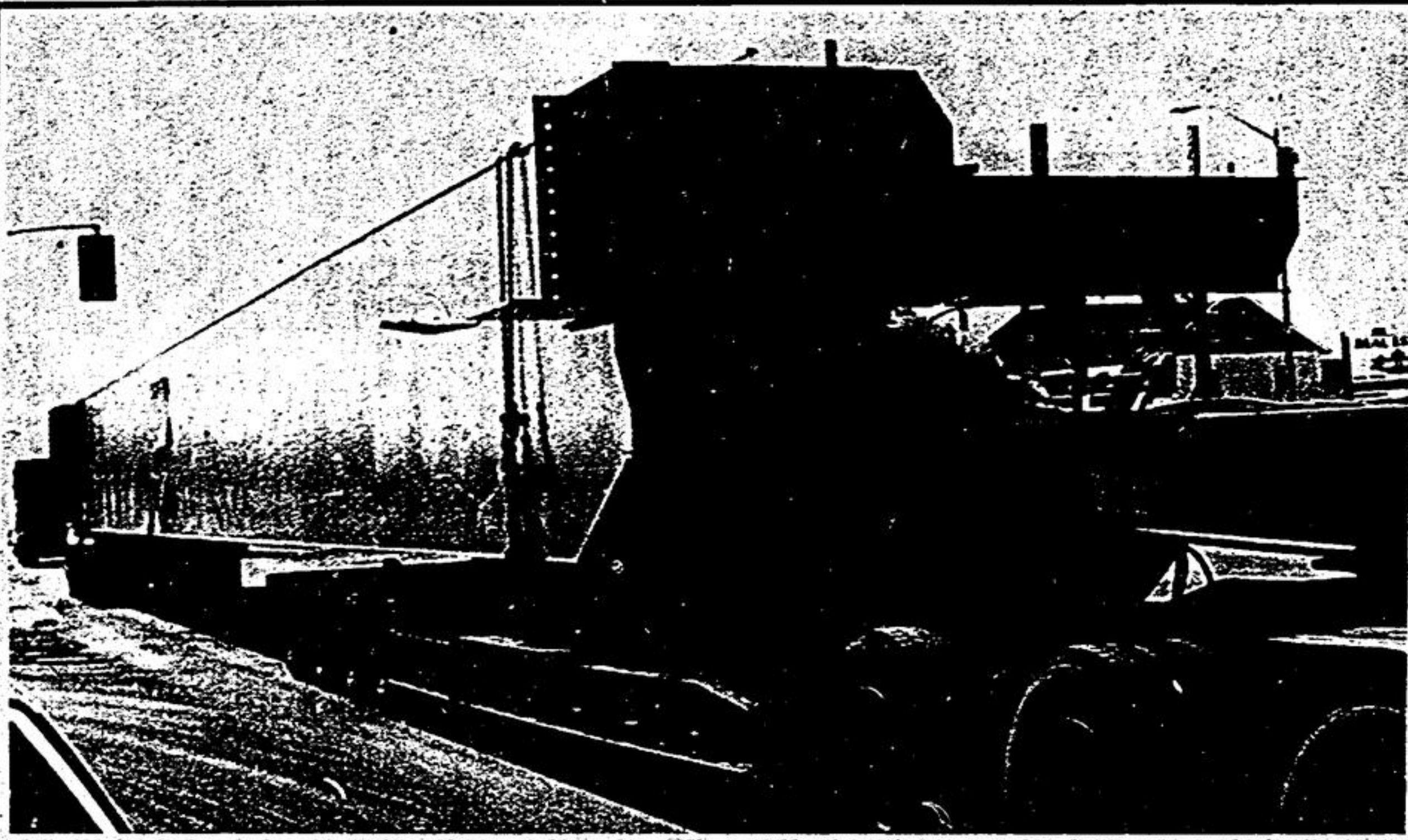
"It was not a noxious operation," he said. The latter was among the concerns of the protesters.

Councillor Will Morley, who moved the original application of approval, said that, because of the non-conforming de-

signation, council couldn't put controls on the property. However, with re-zoning approval, it could be controlled by a site plan agreement.

A motion by Councillor Jim Sanders to rescind the previous motion of approval, was agreed upon. The motion also called for a report from the town by-law officer, Bruce Arrowsmith.

Mayor Eldred King, citing a conflict of interest, did not vote.

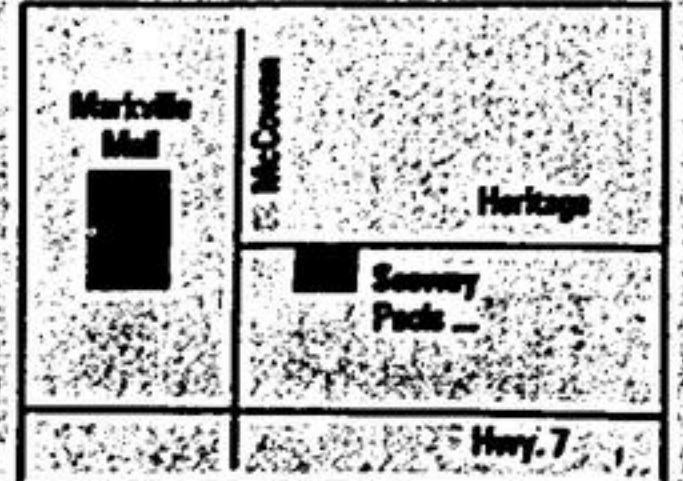
