New H.S. program

Longer periods

STOUFFVILLE — Staff teachers at Stouffville District Secondary School have given overwhelming approval to program changes beginning Sept. '82.

By a vote of 39 to 4, it was agreed that daily instruction should be divided into four 75-minute periods with a common lunch hour.

Principal Michael Muir, proponent of the plan, sees many benefits to its adoption including more work accomplished during longer periods and less confusion due to fewer subject changes.

Mr. Muir says he's anxious to accommodate more adults into regular classes, particularly technical and business training subjects.

Describing the ballot result as "amazing", Muir said comments expressed outside the school had also been positive.

While new to S.D.S.S., the 75-minute period has been tested in other schools, in-

cluding Uxbridge, with much success, he said. Area Superintendent Bill McVicar has given the proposal his blessing.

"Once we have the timetable in place, we'll be able to indicate the subject courses available," Principal Muir explained. He hopes to have

this work completed by the end of April.

As to enrolment figures for the fall, he estimates only 725 students for the start of the September term. This drop in attendance will make it necessary to remove five teachers from staff and place them elsewhere.

Dog rescued from farm silo

WHITCHURCH — There's never a dull day in the life of Whitchurch-Stouffville's canine control officer, Judy Barrett.

Recently, she was called on to rescue a dog trapped in a silo on the Vandorf Road, between Hwy. 48 and Conc. 7. The animal, a German Shepherd-Collie cross, had been there about a week, she said.

Judy used a rope to lower herself down then, with the dog

in her arms, climbed up a ladder to get it out.

Occupants of the house said they could hear the animal whining but couldn't determine where the sound was coming from. The bottom of the silo was so dark, she couldn't see a thing, Judy said.

"It would have eventually starved," she stated.

The dog is presently being cared for at Ryan's Kennels on the Stouffville-Gormley Road. He's available for adoption.

Budget deferred

Hockey costs soar

STOUFFVILLE — To operate Whitchurch-Stouffville's Minor Hockey Association for 1982, the executive has requested a grant of \$39,432.07 from the Recreation Committee. This represents an increase of \$10,832 over the 1981 application.

Approval of the amount has been delayed pending a meeting with the Association's convener, March 29.

YORK REGION — York Regional Police Commission honored Deputy-Chief Bob Hood at a meeting March 17. He was presented with a beautiful dress sword by Markham Mayor Tony Roman. Deputy-Chief Hood, a native of Buttonville, is retiring from the

Force after 30½ years in police work.

His career began with the O.P.P. detachment at Cornwall. In 1955, he joined the Markham Twp. Department and later advanced to the regional force when it was

organized in 1971. He has held the position of deputy-chief there since that time.

Mayor Roman described Mr. Hood as one of the finest men he had come to know. On behalf of the Commission, he wished him many years of happy retirement.

Town symbol is 'magic'

STOUFFVILLE — Magic Town, Ontario. That's Stouffville's adopted symbol, a feature that promoters hope will characterize the community from coast to coast. The patron saint is Arthur Latcham, a man considered by many to have been one of the best magicians in North America if not the world. Mr. Latcham died Aug. 10, 1979.

The symbol's introduction will take the form

of a four-day Magic Festival, May 6, 7, 8 and 9. The project co-ordinator is chief librarian George Schlukbier, working in co-operation with Town Council, the Chamber of Commerce and local service clubs. Twenty-five magic acts are planned involving fifty performers. These will take place at various locations including Latcham Hall, the Regal Restaurant, the Monte Cristo Restaurant, the Deer Park Inn, the

Stouffville Restaurant, Latcham Gallery, the Sales Barn and on Main Street. A mammoth Festival Magic Show is being arranged for the High School on Sat., May 8 at 8 p.m.

The week will conclude with a dedication ceremony in Latcham Gallery, Sunday, May 9 at 3:30. The program is to be made an annual event.

Mr. Schlukbier says the festival will be the largest of

its kind in Canada. The cost has been estimated at close to \$5,000, a portion of which will be reclaimed through ticket sales and other promotions. Many of the attractions will be free.

"It will put Stouffville on the map," said Chamber of Commerce president Graydon Card, "it's what we need to pull the town together." Attendance in excess of five thousand is expected.

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Education hike average of \$68

STOUFFVILLE — A 21 million dollar increase in the York Region Board of Education budget will hike taxes on the average Whitchurch-Stouffville home by about \$68.00. Last year, education costs on the same property (\$20,000 assessment), went up \$45. The latest increase means approximately \$620 of the total tax bill will be for education purposes.

Newmarket's Craig Cribar said such a move would only result in borrowing funds at high interest rates. "I'd rather pay ten cents extra now than ten dollars later — and so would the taxpayers," he said.

Harry Bowes of Whitchurch-Stouffville took exception to providing transportation for some 200 students attending French Immersion classes in four Yonge Street area schools. He said that while the present cost is only \$168,000, "we'll be paying a million before long." He advocated car pools.

Irritating to him too, was the fact general administration had gone up 212 per cent since 1981 with 30 more people on staff. He called it "featherbedding."

"We have more people here than in Durham and yet they have 5,000 more students," he said.

Bowes criticized the hiring of an energy manager. "All he does is call up the schools and ask the principals to turn the thermostats down."

The local trustee took a verbal swipe at some fellow members, saying "too few are

interested in saving money". "As far as I'm concerned, there are too many housewives and teachers on the board".

Summing up the 20 per cent budget increase, Bowes said, "some say education's a bargain. We ought to be thankful we have the means to live beyond its cost".

Contract

STOUFFVILLE — Standard Pressure Pipe Co., Bethesda Road, Whitchurch-Stouffville, has been awarded a contract by the Region of Durham, in excess of \$2½ million.

The Town firm submitted the lowest of five bids for a pipeline that will extend from the Town of Whitby to the Town of Pickering, phasing out the present Pickering water plant.

The decision was announced this week by Durham Region's Chairman, Gary Herrema. Exact amount of the tendered price was \$2,513,445.00.

No tax hike in Markham

MARKHAM — For the sixth year in a row, the Town of Markham has recorded a zero increase in its municipal general tax rate.

The good news was revealed by treasurer Alex Barton at a meeting of Council Tuesday night. He described the result as "another successful year of operations".

Keeping the tax rate down has helped Markham attract quality industrial and commercial assessment, he said, pointing to the fact that in 1971, value totalled \$200,000,000. Today, it's in excess of one billion.

Similarly, residential value has increased from \$900,000,000 to \$2½ billion during the same period.

Barton said Markham's policy of self-sustaining practices for new development is paying off. "When you come into our restaurant, you pay for the meal," he stated.

The treasurer praised the co-operation received from the mayor and members of council; the budget review committee; heads of departments and the municipal staff.

He described the zero increase as "remarkable", particularly with inflation abnormally high and the economy dragging its feet".

Two-car crash

Both the Worsel auto, a 1980 Oldsmobile and the Harper vehicle, a 1974 Chevrolet were demolished with property damage estimated at \$9,000.
