Soccer clinic

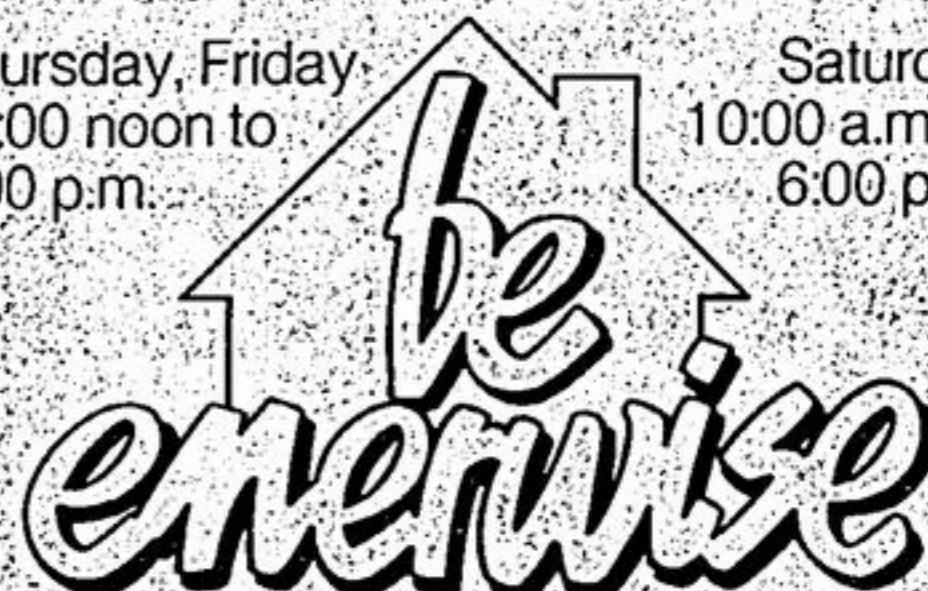
