A public meeting will be held by the Planning Committee of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, as noted above, to present and discuss the following proposed Official Plan Amendment:

Amendment No. 7, to the Official Plan of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville planning area which changes the land use designation from "RURAL" to "ESTATE RESIDENTIAL" on part of LOTS 23, 24 and 25, CONCESSION 5. The subject site, comprising approximately 240 acres, has frontages on both the 5th CONCESSION ROAD (Warden Avenue) and KENNEDY ROAD (6th Concession Road), and is partially adjacent to the Canadian National Railway. The proposed Amendment is a result of an application to permit a 62 lot estate residential development.

You are invited to attend the meeting and to state your support of or objection to the proposed amendment. Should you be unable to attend, written submissions will be received up to the time of the meeting. The amending document may be examined at the Municipal Building, 19 Civic Avenue, Stouffville, during regular business hours. (8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.)

TOWN OF WHITCHURCH-STOUFFVILLE

WATER RESTRICTIONS EFFECTIVE IMMEDIATELY

DUE TO THE EXCESSIVE DEMAND OF WATER IN THE STOUFFVILLE AREA IT IS NECESSARY TO ENFORCE THE FOLLOWING WATER RESTRICTIONS:

The use of a hose for the watering of lawns is prohibited for the months of June, July, August and September with the following exceptions:

A. That part of the former Village of Stouffville lying west of the C.N.R. right-of-way may use a hose for watering lawns and gardens between the hours of 8:00 A.M. to 9:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. ONLY on even numbered calendar days.

B. That part of the former Village of Stouffville lying east of the C.N.R. right-of-way may use a hose for watering lawns and gardens between the hours of 8:00 A.M. to 9:00 A.M. and 8:00 P.M. to 9:00 P.M. ONLY on odd numbered calendar days.

WARNING

Failure to abide by these watering restrictions could result in a \$1,000.00 fine.

School bus safety

Stiffer penalties

According to police and vehicle operators, present laws governing school bus safety aren't being obeyed.

This is the reason behind the Ontario Ministry of Transportation and Communication's proposed amendments to the Highway Traffic Act. These amendments will tighten the rules for motorists approaching stopped school buses.

The new amendments call for stiffer penalties for drivers moving in either direction who fail to stop for a stationary school bus with alternate red signal lights flashing front and back.

If the amendments are accepted by the Legislature, they will go into effect Sept. 1 with

the result that fines will be increased for the first offences and jail sentences may be imposed as well as increased fines for repeated offences.

Demerit points for failure to stop will be increased from four to six and the stopping distance will be set at 20 meters behind the bus.

The Ministry is also proposing that school buses be equipped with stop arms by Sept. 1. There is also demand for the installation of cross-over mirrors to assist drivers in seeing children walking in

front of the vehicle. It's important for parents and teachers to remind children of the need for caution when getting on and off school buses. While these drivers are well trained and conscientious of their responsibilities, they still need the co-operation of everyone.

Every school day, more than 600,000 children are transported by these means. The safety of these young people is the special responsibility of the motorist. When you see a school bus, slow down and pay extra

attention to the road. Death or injury to one boy girl is a tragedy that can be avoided by following the required safety rules. Just remember, the child you save may be your own!

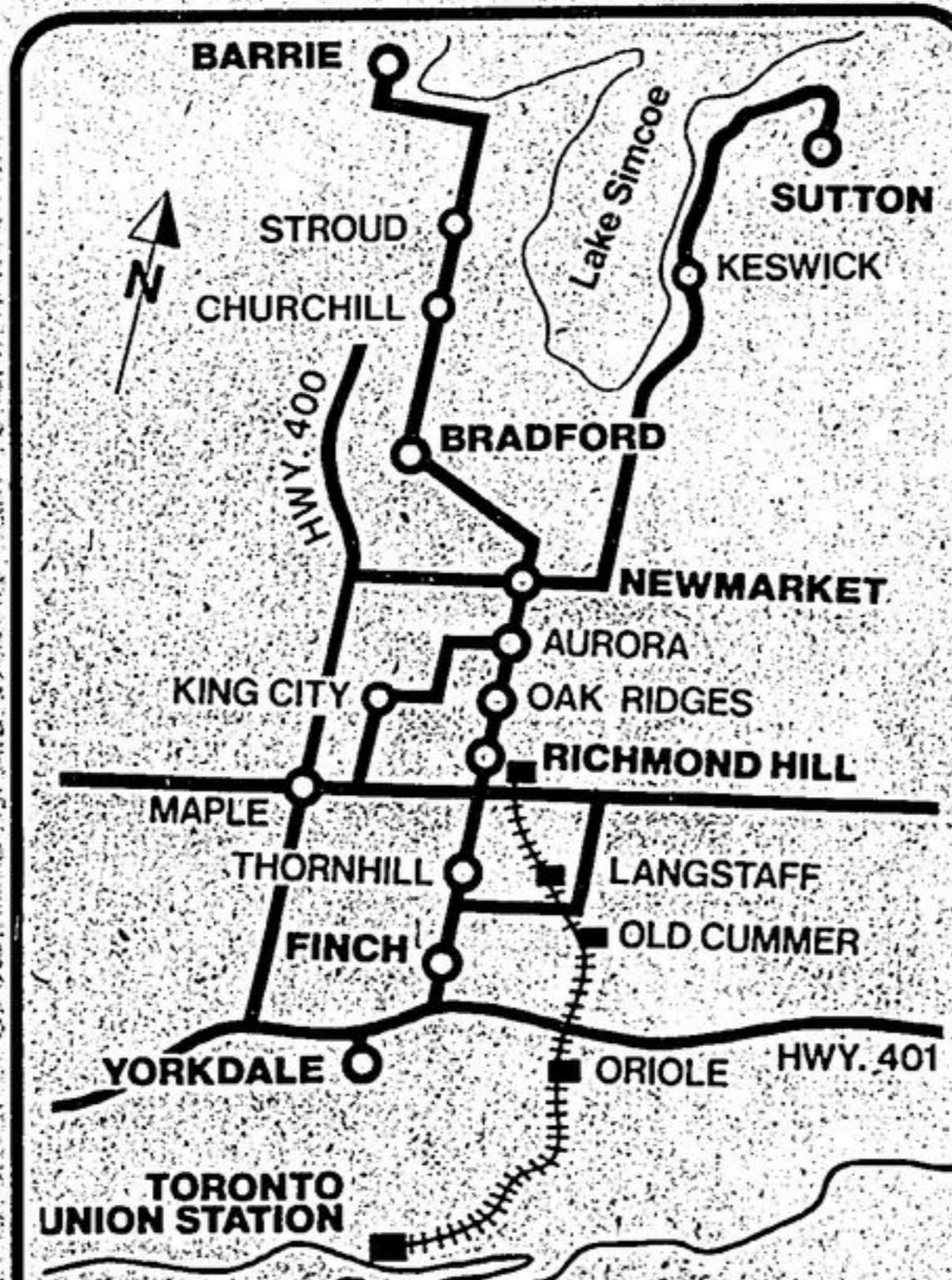
