Your paper's advertising department was most helpful to Sandy Barbuto and did a splendid job of arranging our ad.

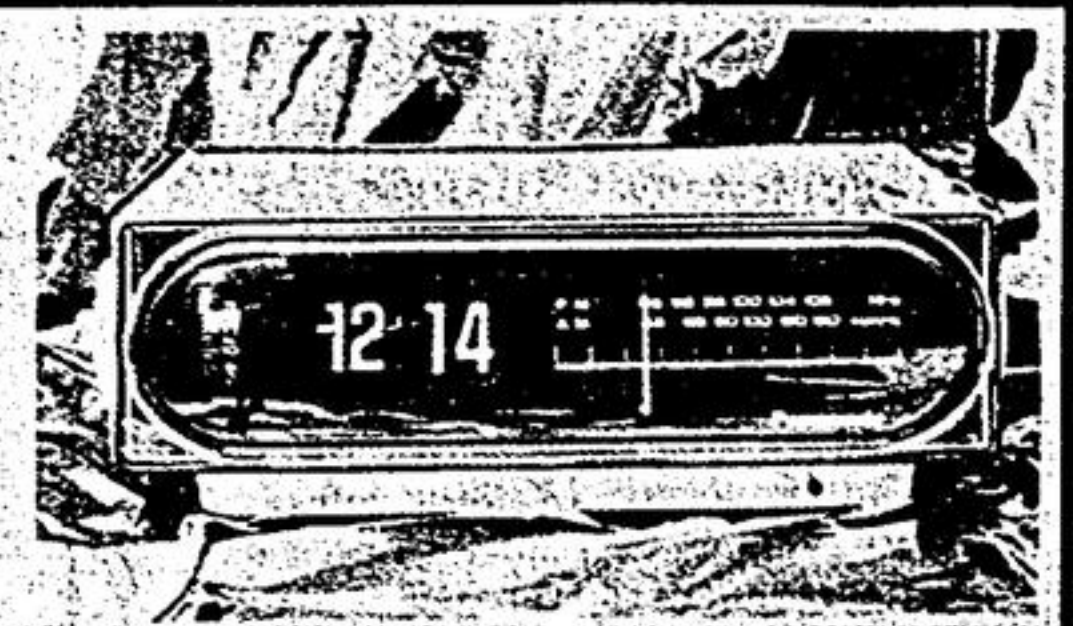
The Page 1 coverage, two weeks in a row, was of great benefit; also, the notices in the community calendar section were very effective.

Last, but not least, the editorial cartoon was very special. It produced a good many laughs and much joy to

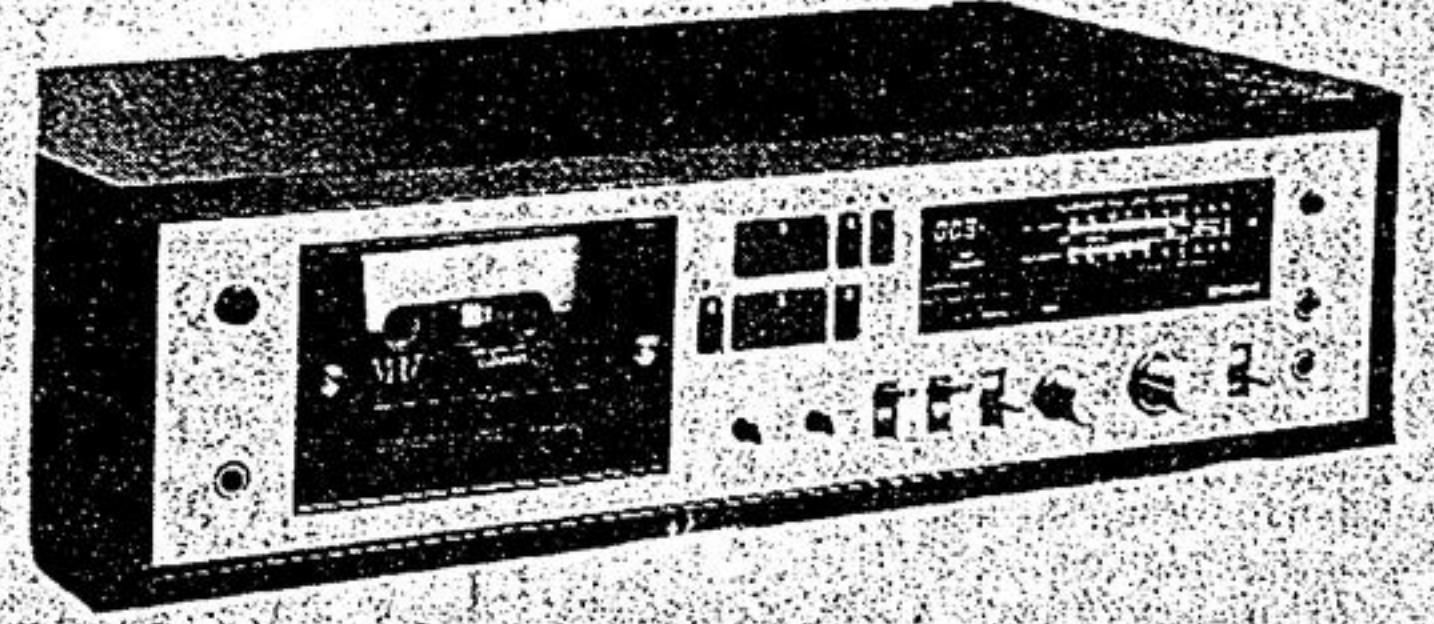

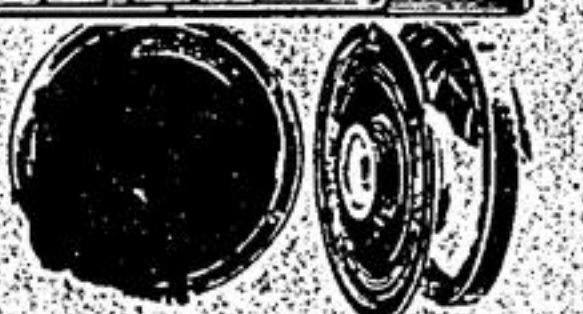

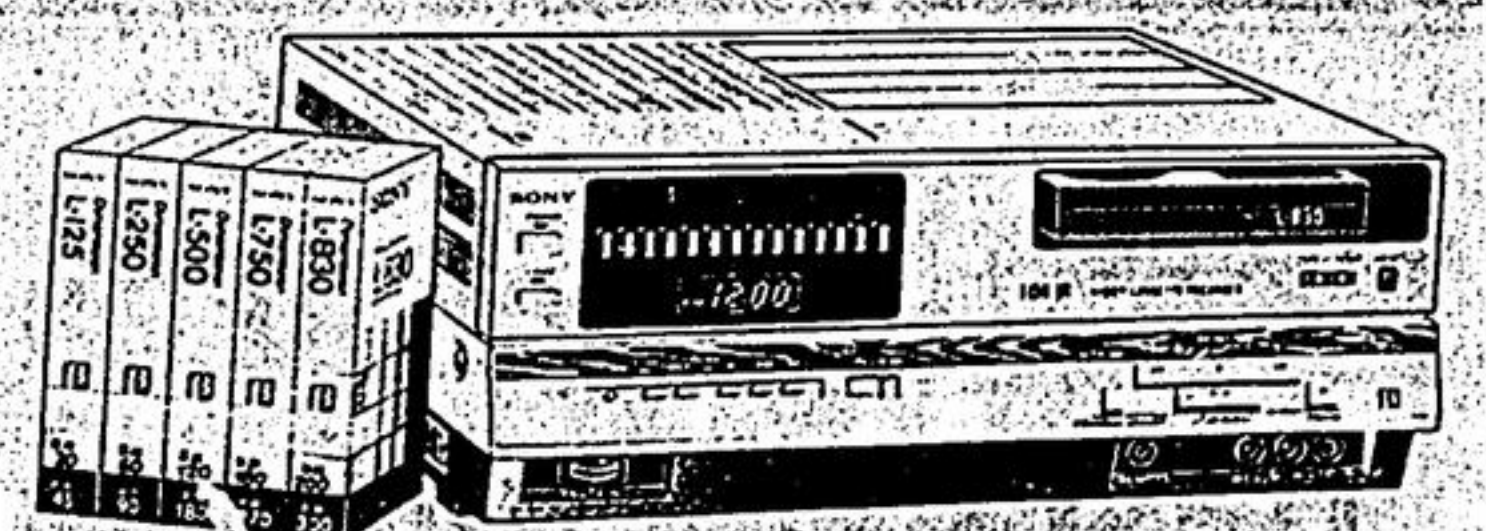
