In all, three persons were awarded the Star of Courage, and 25 men and women received the Medal of Bravery. It was a long way and

a long time from the tragic night in March, 1980 when none of the three men had been remotely concerned with 'being brave' or receiving medals heroism. All Canadian nation. three men expressed pride in being so honored by their country, but that night two years, ago, they were too involved in trying to save the lives of three young people. They received the congratulations of the Governor General

and Mrs. Schreyer with dignity. Among the special guests invited to the Ottawa ceremony were Mrs. Gladys Rolling, vice-chairman of the York Regional Police Commission; Sinclair Stevens, MP York Peel; and Ron Stewart,

MP Simcoe South. York Regional Police Chief Bruce Crawford was also invited, but couldn't attend because


