Needed?

CLAREMONT - Is grade 13 ... istudents would miss too many necessary?

It'an age-old question and one that will probably never be answered to everyone's satisfaction, but it's one that never seems to be out of the news.

Right now, a group of parents in Durham Region, is convinced that the extra year of high school - Ontario is the only province with it - is absolutely necessary to the over-all wellbeing of students. And to that purpose, they have asked education minister, Bette Stephenson, to keep it in.

Says' Sandra Malachowski, co-chairman of the Parents Advisory Council of O'Neill Collegiate, Oshawa, in a letter to the minister: "A child grows up fast enough in this world without rushing ... into another walk of life without that extra year of maturity."

Not so, says Claremont Trustee, Linda Carder. "I don't think that's a valid point. You're not going to tell me other students (outside of Ontario) are deprived of a proper education; that Ontario students are the only ones to get a good one?"

Mrs. Malachowski said, also,

basic subjects without grade 13. Students entered in university mathematics' programs, would not have such subjects as calculus if they missed grade

Mrs. Carder, however, feels a condensed program could be made to fit in these extras, if high schools just went to grade 12. The question there would be whether some students would drop out as a result, she said.

Trustee Carder said that students planning to go to unviversity, are told by grade 10 what subjects they will need to gain entry, and plan accordingly. However, those changing their minds later on, can pick up the subjects they need via night school or summer school programs in the Region.

"Right now, many unemployed students are taking advantage of the courses to, pick up extra credits," she said. Grade 13 only means that tax-

payers pick up the cost at the local and provincial level, whereas university costs are private, she said. Trustee Carder said dropping

grade 13, would also mean that university would now go to four years from the present three.
