

Late Merten D. Brown Had many friends

CASHEL — The Cashel community lost a good friend and former neighbor, last week, in the passing July 19 of Merten D. Brown, an area resident many years.

Mr. Brown, more recently of Parkview Home in Stouffville, was the hamlet's "good humor man", turning frowns into smiles wherever he went. He was 65.

Born at Cashel, the son of Edmund and Margaret Brown, he attended school at Colty Corners, R.R. 1, Unionville and Richmond Hill. As a boy, he assisted his father in the operation of two general stores, one at Cashel and the other in Victoria Square. He would often tell of accompanying his dad on horse team "expeditions" to Toronto during a time when this practise was common.

Prior to entering a partnership in the firm of National Stationers, Toronto, he was a staff member with Sterling Bank, working in several branches including Moncton, Ont., and Hamilton. He served in the Royal Flying Corps during World War I.

Merten Brown was keenly interested in politics at the local level and while never standing for office, he

usually attended nomination and pre-election meetings.

But, most of all he was interested in people, engaging in conversations at every opportunity.

He was a generous person, one of the main supporters of the Peach's softball team during its early years of organization. He

assisted in the purchase of the club's first set of uniforms.

For twenty years, he lived in East York, later moving back to Cashel where he remained until declining health forced him to take up residence at Parkview Home, Stouffville.

For Merten Brown, his family was an im-

portant part of his life. He followed their activities at every turn.

Besides his wife, the former Daisy Murray, he is survived by two sons, Neil of Udon and Denton, R.R. 1, Stouffville; seven grandchildren and six great-grandchildren. A brother, Millard lives at Bobcaygeon and a sister, Mabel Wilson resides in Etobicoke. He

was predeceased by one brother, Everett of Richmond Hill.

Funeral service, Thursday, was conducted by Rev. Alf Reese from the Markham Missionary Church with interment Victoria Square Cemetery. Pallbearers were Neil, David, Paul and Scott Brown; David Thompson and Kenneth Prudham.
