# Seneca summer program proves a great success

STOUFFVILLE.—The Children's Summer Program, sponsored by Seneca College, has entered its second phase. The coordinator is Cathy Richardson. The counsellors are Cheryl Price, Mike McGinn and Brad Steele. Twenty-eight boys and girls were enrolled in the first 2-week session. The second started July 26 and the third, Aug. 8. There's still time to enter the third session. The registration fee is \$70 and the contact numbers are 640-2395 (The Library) and 640-1350 (Seneca Office). "I love it," says Cathy. "It's nice to be back working with children." She describes her helpers as "fine kids." The boys and girls range in age from six to twelve years. In addition to sports, the children are taught different crafts including pottery, puppetry,

drawing and painting, batik, paper mache, ceramics and kite making. Swimming, described as "a highlight," takes place daily from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday. Each session features one trip. The first was to Pioneer Village; the second will be to Cullen Gardens and the third to the Metro Zoo.




