

Soccerfest win for McNeil "goldies"

The intensity and drama witnessed by soccer fans over the weekend at the Whitchurch-Stouffville Soccer Club's International Soccerfest '82 reached its peak in the final when, after a scoreless game, plus two ten minute overtime periods, the battle between Stouffville's unbeaten McNeil Labs and the Sudbury Hawks was still undecided.

It was not until the seventh ball of the shootout that McNeil's Gary Bodimead tucked the ball nicely into the top side of the net, leaving netminder Jeff Holden to make his final save of the day, a spectacular full-reach dive onto the deck that pushed the ball around the post. The champions had their hands full in the opener, facing a very aggressive

and determined team from Barrie, who scored in the first half and led the game right up until the final 18 seconds of the game. Travis Whites' late goal saved the day for a 1-1 finish.

Going on to down the Woburn Wolves 5-0; McNeil had their first win against this powerful team in three years. Goal scorers were: Richie Holden, Travis White, Dube Bader, Drea Glover and Jamie Grist.

A scoreless third round game against the Hawks gave an indication of a tough final. Ernie Sluga did some fine defensive work for McNeil and, although the strikers were unable to score, they proved adept at mid-field passing.

Defeating Sudbury 5-

1 in the semi-final produced a solid defense by Richard Altman, John Humphries and Gary Bodimead and gave the strikers a field-day of opportunities.

It was a classic offensive-defensive battle for the trophy, with McNeil the aggressors providing some very clever and well balanced plays by midfielder Travis White and wingers Gilles Francis, Drea Glover and Jamie Grist, hitting the crossbar on four successive occasions and giving their fans - and coach Alfons Rubbens - some heart-stopping, finger-biting moments.

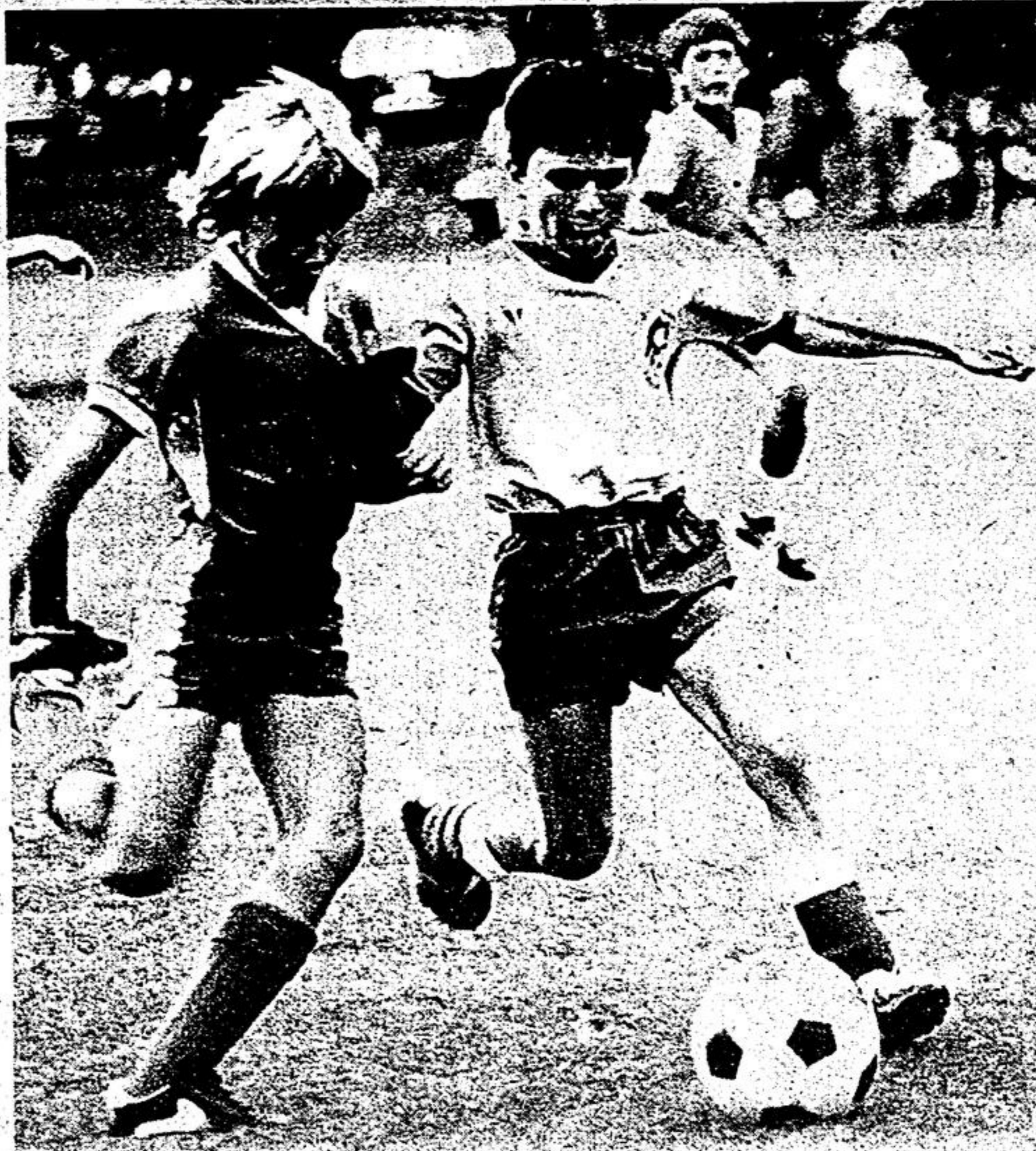
Center strikers Dube Bader and Ritchie Holden came close to scoring, but there was always a post or defen-

der there to deflect the ball.

It was soccer at its best. Unfortunately there had to be a winner and a loser. Despite winning on a shootout the best team won. McNeil's sheer persistence and dogged determination to take the game into the Sudbury half paid off; also, tactically, they were the better team.

Presenting the plaques and trophies to the finalists, Mayor Eldred King congratulated the players on their fine sportsmanship and soccer skills and hoped the tournament would continue to attract top soccer talent in future years.
