The 12-8 last minute win for Little Britain did not reflect overwhelming superiority by the visitors; just a serious lack of defensive play by their hosts. The Clippers put on a fine performance in a clear game that had few penalties, and showed that they are indeed competitive if they do something about their dismal defense.

This Saturday's home game is against Cobourg at 7:30 p.m. With the team showing improved form they deserve a little fan support.


