The 12-8 last minute win for Little Britain did not reflect overwhelming superiority by the visitors, just a serious lack of defensive play by their hosts. The Clippers put on a fine performance in clean game that had few penalties, and showed that they are indeed competitive if they do something about their dismal defense.

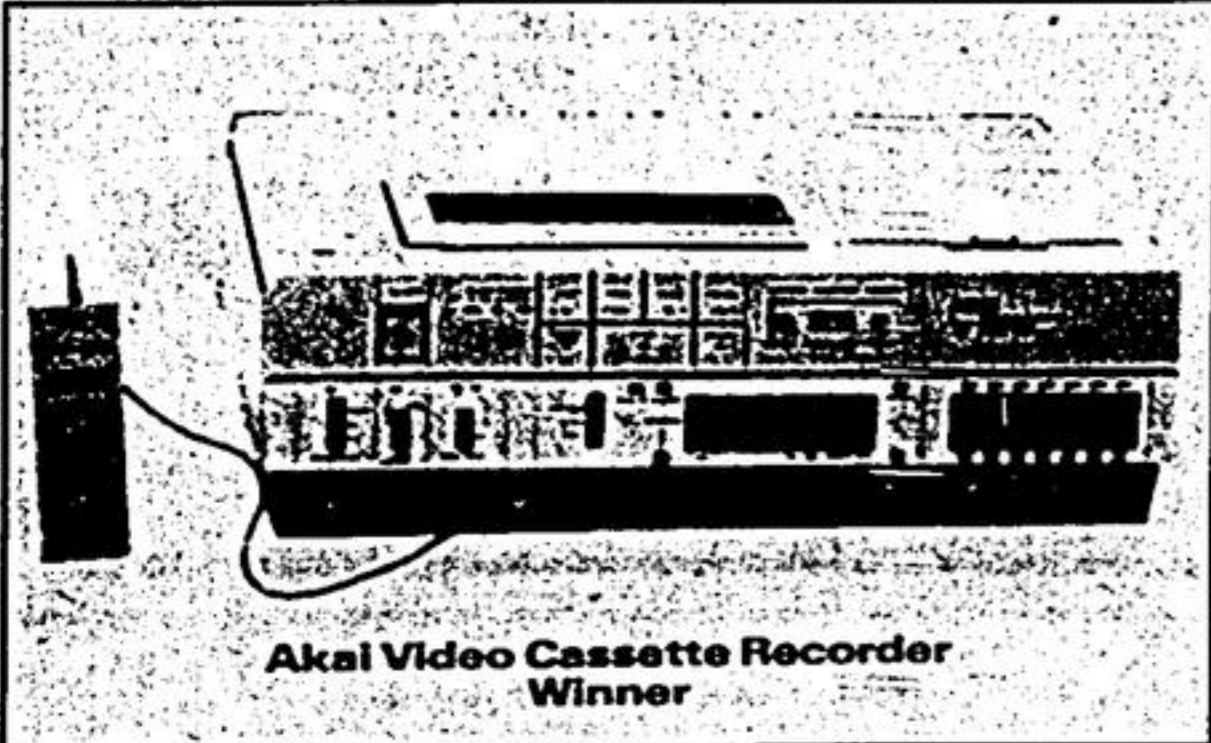
