YORK REGION — The importance of regarding the Region of York as a co-ordinator, rather than as an entity of its own, was stressed by York chairman, Bob Forhan, at a recent press conference.

In meeting with representatives of the Region's media, Forhan said he was interested in "getting more coverage of the Region's activities from the latter, in other than just their immediate areas."

The Region had been set up to tie the nine participating municipalities together, and it was necessary that they think of it in that way, both in dealing with their individual problems, and in seeking and/or attracting industry and residents to the area.

"New business anywhere in the Region, benefits us all," the chairman said. The same could be said of "new assessment."

In an effort to help publicize the huge area of the Region, which runs from the Township of Georgina in the north, to Metropolitan Toronto, in the south, Forhan said the Region would soon be distributing its first industrial brochure, highlighting some of the reasons why businesses should locate throughout its vast expanses.
