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# Former Stouffville student returns as country pastor

LEMONTVILLE — For Wayne Reed, Northern Ontario is home. However, Wayne's not about to deny the fact that Whitchurch-Stouffville is his "second home"; the people in the communities of Lemontville and Ballantrae have made him feel this way. "They've been very kind," he says.

Wayne is the student pastor at this two-point charge, holding services at 9:30 a.m. (Lemontville) and 11 a.m. (Ballantrae). He and wife Marie (Patenden) along with their three boys, Michael, 8; Peter, 4 and Philip, 1 1/2 live in the manse on the Bloomington Road. They're enjoying the experience of renewing acquaintances in the area for both Wayne and Marie have strong ties here.

During the time his father, T. Edward Reed, was the manager at the Bank of Commerce Branch in Stouffville, Wayne attended at S.D.S.S., graduating in 1970. Later, he was employed with A & P, holding positions at Bracebridge, Sudbury

and Kirkland Lake. Having been born at Sault Ste. Marie, this was like "going home", he said.

It was five years ago that he decided to enter the ministry. He obtained his B.A. degree from the University of Ottawa and is currently working towards his Master of Divinity degree at Emmanuel College, Toronto.

Wayne admits he's always had a deep-rooted interest in the church both as a layman and in a pastoral role. His wife, he says, has been "a tremendous help". He calls it "a shared ministry".

Wayne feels a deep commitment to rural congregations and much prefers this association to the city. The closeness of the people creates an atmosphere that's difficult to describe, he says.

# Century milestone

An "open house" was held Sept. 6 in the Community Hall at Fordwich, Ont., in honor of Mrs. Elizabeth Byer. The occasion was her 100th birthday.

Mrs. Byer, the former Elizabeth Reesor, is the daughter of Peter B. and Susannah (Wideman) Reesor and a direct descendant of the pioneer Reesor families that settled in the Markham and Cedar Grove areas during the 1870's.

Born at Scarborough in 1882, she later married Joseph Byer in 1910. They farmed around Stouffville and Markham until 1947 when they moved to the Gorrie community. Mr. Byer died in 1968.

Mrs. Byer is proud of her family that includes three daughters—Susannah (Mrs. John Housser) of Markham; Annie (Mrs. Wm. Werner), R.R. 1, Wroxeter; Flora of Port Perry; and three

sons, Levi, R.R. 1, Clifford, Ont.; Alvin and Harvey of Stouffville. There are 17 grandchildren and 42 great-grandchildren.

Mrs. Byer enjoys good health and her memory is excellent. She recalls when bread was five cents a loaf and sugar five cents a pound. A plain postcard took a one cent stamp, she remembers.

She's pleased to have "escaped" the metric system.

Mrs. Byer was the recipient of 101 cards, one from as far distant as Australia. She received a telephone call from British Columbia and a third-generation telegram from North Bay. A message from the Queen arrived from Buckingham Palace.

Other telegrams were received from Governor-General John Aird; Premier Wm. Davis and M.P.P. Murray Elston.
