Girl unaffected by TV stardom

Being a star is one thing, but being a normal, six-year-old is more important.

That's the way Audra Williams, daughter of Marie and Gary Williams, R.R. 1, Unionville, looks at her soaring career as an actress in numerous commercials, and as a principal in the popular soap opera, "Lov-

ing Friends and Perfect Couples". In fact, the biggest thrill of all as far as Audra's concerned was obtaining her card as a member of ACTRA, the Association of Canadian Television and Radio Artists.

"She was more excited about that than anything," says her mother, Marie Wil-

liams.

Not without reason. Joining the acting union is not easy. A performer must obtain six working permits (above the status of an extra) in two years. For commercials, the first one costs \$200; the remainder, \$150 each. Permits in other roles are \$50 and up. Total credits can be based on one medium or both.

Mrs. Williams says Audra's union card cost \$1,400.

For both Audra and her mother, it's been an exhilarating, but tough grind. The four-week contract with the soap opera, has meant many hours each day at Global Studios, with breaks in between being used by the Grade 2 student at Dickson's Hill School, to catch up on her studies.

The school and the teachers, "have been great," says Mrs. Williams, adding that, if Audra doesn't keep up with her work, "she

hears about it".

So far, Audra has made numerous commercials at home and 21 for AIM Department Stores in the United States.

"It's all happened so fast; it's caught her by surprise. But she's taking it in stride," says Mrs. Williams. "She really doesn't want to talk about it; she just wants to be a normal six-year-old kid."

She also wants to act, and didn't like it one little bit when Mrs. Williams turned down a Pepsi commercial, because she thought Audra had been working hard enough.

Right now, the producers of the soap opera are deciding whether to make her a permanent member of the show. The youthful star, who went to acting school when she was four, keeping her little fingers crossed.

When it comes to acting, her mother says, "she loves it".

Mailing Of Assessment Notices

A 1982 Assessment Notice for 1983 municipal and school taxes will be mailed on or before December 3rd to every property owner and tenant in the following municipalities:

Regional Municipality of Durham including the City of Oshawa; the Towns of Ajax, Newcastle, Pickering, Whitby; and the Townships of Brock, Scugog and Uxbridge.

Two Information Inserts mailed with your Assessment Notice explain the appeal procedure and provide the timetable of Open Houses in your area.

Open House Sessions Will Answer Questions

Open House sessions have been planned at convenient times and locations in your municipality to afford you the opportunity to review your assessment with staff of the Regional Assessment Office.

Assessment staff will be pleased to explain the basis of your property assessment and are authorized to amend all data (school support, assessment, etc.) on your Notice.

You are encouraged to take advantage of this service.

Rolls Available For Review

The Assessment Roll will be available for review at your local municipal office during regular business hours, beginning December 22nd, 1982.

If You Wish To Appeal

If you believe you have been improperly assessed in any way,

you may file a formal complaint with the Assessment Review Board. The final date for filing an appeal is January 11th, 1983.

Information on appeal procedures is provided on the back of your Assessment Notice and in the Information Inserts.

Residential Properties Insulated With Urea Formaldehyde Foam

A residential property which has been insulated with Urea Formaldehyde Foam (U.F.F.) may qualify for a 35 per cent reduction to the residential building portion of the 1982 property assessment.

Those ratepayers whose residential properties are insulated with U.F.F. are urged to attend an Assessment Open House scheduled in their area or to contact the Regional Assessment Office to confirm their eligibility for this assessment reduction.
