The truth of the matter struck me later. A couple of prominent people in the community had sons who were of age to play Midget hockey, but these boys were not on this Midget team. Therefore the second year players had to be bumped to make room for them. It didn't matter that these newcomers had never played Allstar "A" hockey before in their lives. I see a lot of frustrated parents who are not quite sure what to do. Who you know tends to be the rule rather than the exception in minor hockey in Stouffville. By the time a lot of these young hockey players reach the Midget age level they are just so tired of it they eliminate the problem by quit-


