### Charges laid in fatality

UXBRIDGE - Charges of dangerous driving and careless driving, have been laid against one of the drivers in an accident at the intersection of Major Mackenzie Drive and McCowan Rd., Dec. 28.

The collision took the lives of David and Emily Garvin, both 54, of Baldwin. William Pritchard, 25, of Uxbridge, driver of the other vehicle, suffered minor injuries. He has now been charged with the two counts, according to Insp. Ted McBrien, of York Regional Police.

The accident took place about 6:20 p.m., during a windstorm, which blacked out traffic lights at the intersection. The Baldwin car was northbound on McCowan Road when it was in collision with the eastbound Pritchard van.

Mr. Garvin was pronounced dead on arrival at York Central Hospital; his wife died an hour
