Kinsmen survey shows double ice surface necessary - now

Stouffville's Kinsmen Club, in reply to the recreation committee's request for "partisan and nonpartisan input" into the new arena Complex plan, made the following recommendations to the Steering Committee on Monday, April 11.

(a) A two-rink arena is required as there is a present shortage of ice-time.

(b) That phase one of the project, encompassing a two rink arena as well as and Markham. services and landscaping for the complete project, could be done for a cost of under \$2 million and that a completion date of December 31, 1983 is feasible.

establish a group of technical advisors and a committee to spearhead fund-raising. Highlights of the report

were surprising, showing 77 per cent of people interviewed were in favor of a two rink concept, while most favoured going ahead with the complete complex.

Discussion with Town clubs indicated that close to 80 per cent of the 7,200 hours. of ice-time available could be used now; further potential business coming from people unable to obtain icetime in Aurora, Uxbridge

Proposals from two contractors, both specializing in building arenas (over 100 built between them), indicated that the two rinks, along with 3,000 sq.feet of (c) That it is essential to lobby, ten dressing rooms, and a seating capacity of over 800 could be erected within the time frame for under \$2 million.

The survey, carried out by volunteer Kinsmen from the Markham, West Hill, Pickering, Don Valley, Richmond Hill and Stouffville clubs, surveyed 147 homes in the Whitchurch-Stouffville area and found

that 70 per cent favoured support of both the proposed complex and new Stouffville-Markham hospital, whereas 17 per cent supported just the hospital and 7 per cent the complex alone.
