

Editor's Mail —

N.D.P. demand an apology

Dear Sir:

As members of the Durham York NDP, we strongly object to your editorial of April 13, 1983 about the prodisarmament meeting we sponsored at the Uxbridge High School.

You called our meeting a Communist rally. To begin with, a duly-called public meeting sponsored by any NDP riding association is not a Communist meeting. The New Democratic Party represents above all democratic socialism and in no way can it be taken for Communism.

There were many respected members of the community at this meeting. The majority were members of the NDP and included former provincial and federal candidates. In addition, there was a high-ranking elected regional official; a local clergyman; a retired crown attorney; some United Church women who are members of Operation Dismantle; teachers, social

workers, and a general representation of citizens of all ages from all walks of life. You also called our meeting a pro-

Russian rally. Surely it is possible in this free society of ours to discuss Russian history and try to see it in the perspective of world events without having the participants of such a discussion labelled as Communists. Your hysterical rantings bring back the witch-hunting days of Joe McCarthy in the U.S.

Our speaker, Dave Szollosy, tried to address the question, "How do we control what the Russians do?" He began by saying that he did not approve of the Russian system. He explained that there might be grounds to expect that the Soviets would be prepared to negotiate with the U.S. for balanced disarmament. He used historical background and much factual material.

Me. Szollosy also indicated that the U.S. is not entirely without blame for bringing

the world to the point where over \$600 billion is spent annually on arms.

You suggest in your editorial that Canada has no alternative but to agree with the Pentagon request for testing the Cruise and that such action is the only way to cooperate with our southern neighbors.

There are many of us who prefer to cooperate with our southern neighbours by supporting those Americans who are calling for a nuclear freeze. Prominent among these are Walter Mondale, John Glenn and Edward Kennedy (one of whom may easily be the next President) and a majority in the U.S. House of Representatives. We also believe that Canada has an independent role to play similar to other NATO members such as Norway and Belgium.

We feel that you have done a great disservice not only to the New Democratic Party but to the peace movement. We are asking that you withdraw your comments by

printing an apology and a retraction to redress the public record. We require that this appear in the same page location of The Tribune in which your editorial appeared. We further ask that you carry a full and fair news account of the meeting which you did not do in the first place.

A copy of this letter is being sent to the Ontario Press Council of which your paper

is a member. We in the NDP believe that nuclear disarmament is literally a matter of life and death for the human race. There will be no winners in a nuclear war. We believe that all of us must convince our leaders to increase international security through balanced disarmament.
