operating on a shoe-string budget." He said they had cut their staff from four

NOTICE OF APPLICATION

By The Corporation of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville for approval of a proposed by-law imposing a sewer rate in respect of an expansion to the Whitchurch-Stouffville Sewage Treatment Plant and to designate a Sewer Rate Area within the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville.

WHEREAS the Ontario Municipal Board had approved an application by The Regional Municipality of York of the construction of an expansion to the Whitchurch-Stouffville Sewage Treatment Plant at a total estimated cost of \$2,800,000.00.

1. TAKE NOTICE that the Council of The Corporation of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville intends to apply to The Ontario Municipal Board for approval of:

(a) the imposition of a sewer rate in respect of the construction of the expansion to the Whitchurch-Stouffville Sewage Treatment Plant and intends to charge the sum of \$600,000.00, being part of the cost of the work as a sewer rate for a period not exceeding fifteen years upon the owners or occupants of lands who will or may derive a benefit therefrom (immediate benefit and deferred benefit), more particularly described in Schedule "A" hereunder. The said sewer rate will impose upon the owners or occupants of the lands who will derive an immediate benefit are more particularly described in Schedule "B" hereto and as illustrated on the map below and the remainder of the lands described in Schedule "A" shall be considered as receiving a deferred benefit upon which the sewer rate will not be charged until such lands are actually connected to the sewage works or are subdivided.

(b) the passing of a by-law to impose such sewer rate to raise the whole of the annual payments on debentures of \$600,000.00, upon owners or occupants of lands in the immediate benefit area, consisting of:



Any ratepayer may, within twenty-one days after the date of the first publication of this notice, serve personally or by Registered Mail on the Clerk of the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville, at the address given below, a notice in writing stating his objection to the approval of the imposition of the special rate, and the grounds of such objection and that if a public hearing is held, he or his representative will attend such hearing to support such 6. The Ontario Municipal Board may approve of the imposition of the said sewer rate, but

before doing so it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered, but notice of such hearing will be given only to those persons who have given notice of objection as provided for above. N.B. A sketch of the said sewer rate area together with a copy of the by-law may be examined during regular business hours at the office of the Clerk at the Municipal Office, 19 Civic Avenue, Stouffville, between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 4:30 p.m. The lands outlined - outline the entire sewer area including immediate and deferred benefit areas. The immediate benefit area is marked and all the rest of the lands in the sewer area are deferred benefit areas until connected or until subdivided.



The entire area designated for the sewer rate, both immediate and deferred benefit, is: ALL AND SINGULAR all those certain lands and premises in the Town of Whitchurch-Stouffville lying within the area bounded as follows:
