Dear Editor:
April 27th is our unhappy anniversary. It is one year since the Ontario Government made their commitment to the people of Stouffville. Along with a number of other things, the landfill site on Hwy. 48 would be closed by June 30th of this year. Mr. Norton, the Minister of the Environment, said this was being done to restore the peace of mind of local residents.

We all know that this promise was ignored and that we are faced with continued dumping until at least 1985 and possibly. Anyone who drives Hwy. 404 in the mornings does not have to be told of the obvious increase in the number of full garbage trucks headed north since the end of February. However, since the role of the Concerned Citizens Committee has to include the monitoring of events surrounding our landfill site and keeping the residents of the Town advised accordingly, there are a few points that we would like to bring to your attention.

(1). Our plebiscite indicated that an overwhelming majority of the Town felt Mr. Norton should keep his promise. These results were sent to him—he has not even had the courtesy to reply to us. We will be pressing him for such a response.

(2). We were promised a detailed health study, and \$1.2 million was allocated for this purpose. A preliminary study indicated the need for a follow up, but nothing has been done. The Ministry of Health is stalling and even our mayor does not seem to feel this study is necessary. We believe it is absolutely vital, and will be pressing to have it commenced immediately.

(3). We asked for the most sophisticated testing to be done on our town wells. We have been given everything from double-talk to flat refusals. If there is nothing to worry about, why on earth can't we have these tests done for our "peace of mind."
(4). Did you know the residents closest to the landfill still do not have the piped-in alternate water supply they were promised?

We will continue to watch the performance of all those parties whose responsibility it is to safeguard our health and environment, and will report to the residents of the Town on a regular basis.

STOUFFVILLE — A Canada-Ontario Work Incentive Grant of \$375,000, has been approved for the Whitchurch-Stouffville Recreation Department.

Recreation Co-ordinator Liz Lacoursiere told The Tribune the money would be applied to construction of a new Town recreation centre. Work is expected to begin this fall and be completed by June, 1984.

The co-ordinator said eight contractors had been interviewed with a final selection expected soon.
