Guest skaters will be Donald Jackson, World gold medalist in 1962, and Brian Pockar, World bronze medalist in 1982.

Canadian champions to be seen include Barbara Underhill and Paul Martini, third in the World in pairs in 1983, and Brian Orser who won the bronze in men's singles. Also featured will be Tracy Wilson and Robert

McCall, Canadian senior dance champions and sixth in the World event, also Canadian ladies champion, Kay Thomson, who finished seventh in World competition.

Diamonds needed

A report compiled by Recreation Coordinator, Lizette Lacoursiere, shows that there has been a 10 per cent increase in minor softball registration in the municipality over the last year. Participation in adult softball has soared by 50 per cent, due in part to the inexpensive cost to players, sponsorship by large corporations such as Labatts and Molsons, the development of slowpitch leagues and the advent of fun leagues with low-key competition.

This season, the Town's 12 softball leagues will comprise 79 teams, 495 minor and 630 adult players.

The Coordinator's report emphasizes the need for additional diamond space in the future. It recommends that present facilities be upgraded where necessary and that the Whitechurch-Highlands and Ballantrae school diamonds be brought up to standard for use by both adult and minor leagues.
