Town Gallery could close

STOUFFVILLE— Fear that Latcham Gallery would have to close down at the end of May, because town council wouldn't meet its budget demands, was expressed by chief librarian, George Schlukbier, at a meeting of council, last week.

The combined amount sought by the Gallery and the Library was \$150,000. Council, however, reduced the amount to \$146,000.

"The Gallery will have to stop functioning at the end of the month," Schlukbier said when council showed it wasn't going to be budgeted from the figure.

Council had heard appeals from library board members, James West, finance chairman; Lynda Giles and sculptor, Ron Baird.

Baird said he would like to start a permanent art collection and "fill this town up with beautiful works."

Councillor Jim Sanders said council couldn't "take a chance to cut from the gallery. I think the town should be able to handle it."

Schlukbier told The Tribune he had been speaking on his own, regarding the possible folding of the Gallery.

"From an administrative point of view, we have only three areas of flexibility: salaries, books and materials, and the gallery," he said.

"The weakest area of support is the Gallery; the main thing here is book service."

Schlukbier disputed Mayor Eldred King's claim that the board was getting a 3.5 per cent increase. His own figures showed only 3 per cent.

He said the board would meet this week to discuss the gallery's future.

Home Support Services Aiding seniors is prime resolve

STOUFFVILLE— "She keeps the whole thing rolling". This is how Marie Adams, the 1982-83 chairperson of Home Support Services described the work of branch co-ordinator Betty Courage at the annual meeting, May 11. "We appreciate her dedication," she said.

Mrs Courage described the assignments (954); the hours (1,700) and the miles (5,787) put in by the 28 volunteers and 17 home-helpers during the past year. They were assisted by students from the "Hand in Hand" program at the High School and members of the Eta Lambda Chapter of Beta Sigma Phi. The High School students alone completed 171 assignments, Mrs Courage said.

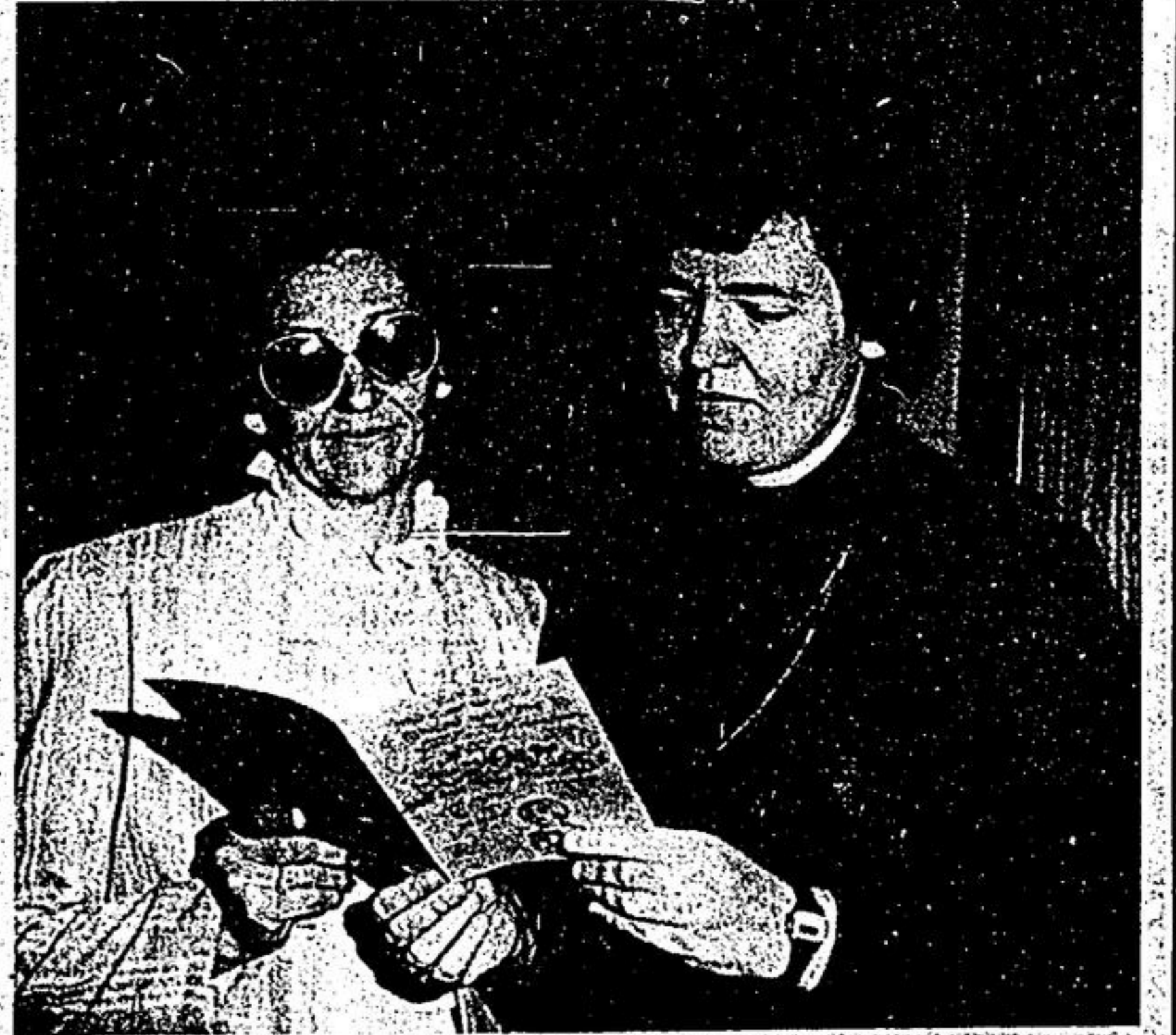

In attendance from the regional board were chairperson Ann Jackson and secretary Pat Vandelzen accompanied by Newmarket branch co-ordinator Bernice Irving.

Board member Mahlon Shantz took the audience on a visual "Walk Down Memory Lane" with a slide presentation depicting some of the changes that have taken place during the lifespan of present day senior citizens—from the horse and buggy to man walking on the moon. Both the camera work and the audio accompaniment were completed by Mr Shantz.
