HISTORY BEHIND THE PLATE

This year, the Unionville Festival Plate, illustrated by local artist, Sharon Bright, depicts the Summerfeldt General Store. The business was opened and operated by Abner Summerfeldt, in co-operation with Charles Stiver.

Abner had farmed for a number of years on land originally acquired by his grandfather George, in 1792. However, in 1910 he moved to the main street of Unionville living above the store that he managed until 1930.

Abner Summerfeldt was a prominent business man and political figure, serving as a reeve on Markham Township Council in 1903 and 1904, as a deputy reeve in 1917, and as a councillor numerous times between 1899 and 1916. He was married three times and raised several children who, when needed, would lend a hand in running the store.

Jennie Harrington recalls what the store was like as a child:

On the right side as we went in was the candy counter. What candies we could get

for one cent! — a bag of mixed candies, a licorice whip, a marshmallow and chocolate broom on a stick, all-day suckers, etc.

The groceries also were on this side. On the other side were yard goods, patterns, thread, etc. At the back — shoes, rubbers, men's overalls...

Abner finally gave up the business in 1930 and it was subsequently managed by James Ash. It has since passed through many hands and still stands on the main street today as an antique store called "Thursday's Child".

The Unionville Festival Plates can be purchased during the festival at a cost of \$7 each at St. Philip's Church Bake Table, located just north of Jug & Basin Antiques on Main Street, and later at the church basement.

There are still plates available from preceding years as well as Festival Mugs for \$3, and Quilt Raffle Tickets for \$1. The quilt will be on display at Ruth Ingram's Antiques during the festival, and the draw will take place at the Post Office stage at 4 p.m. on Saturday.
