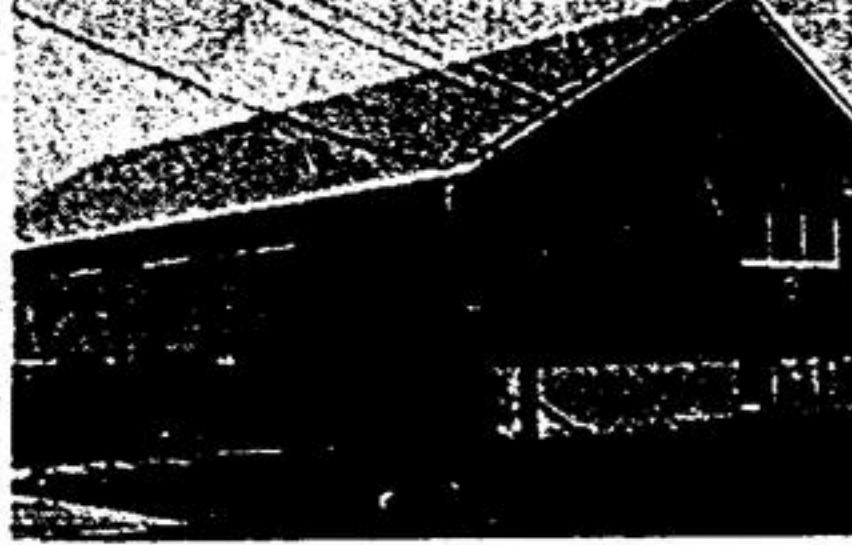

## Music Seminar

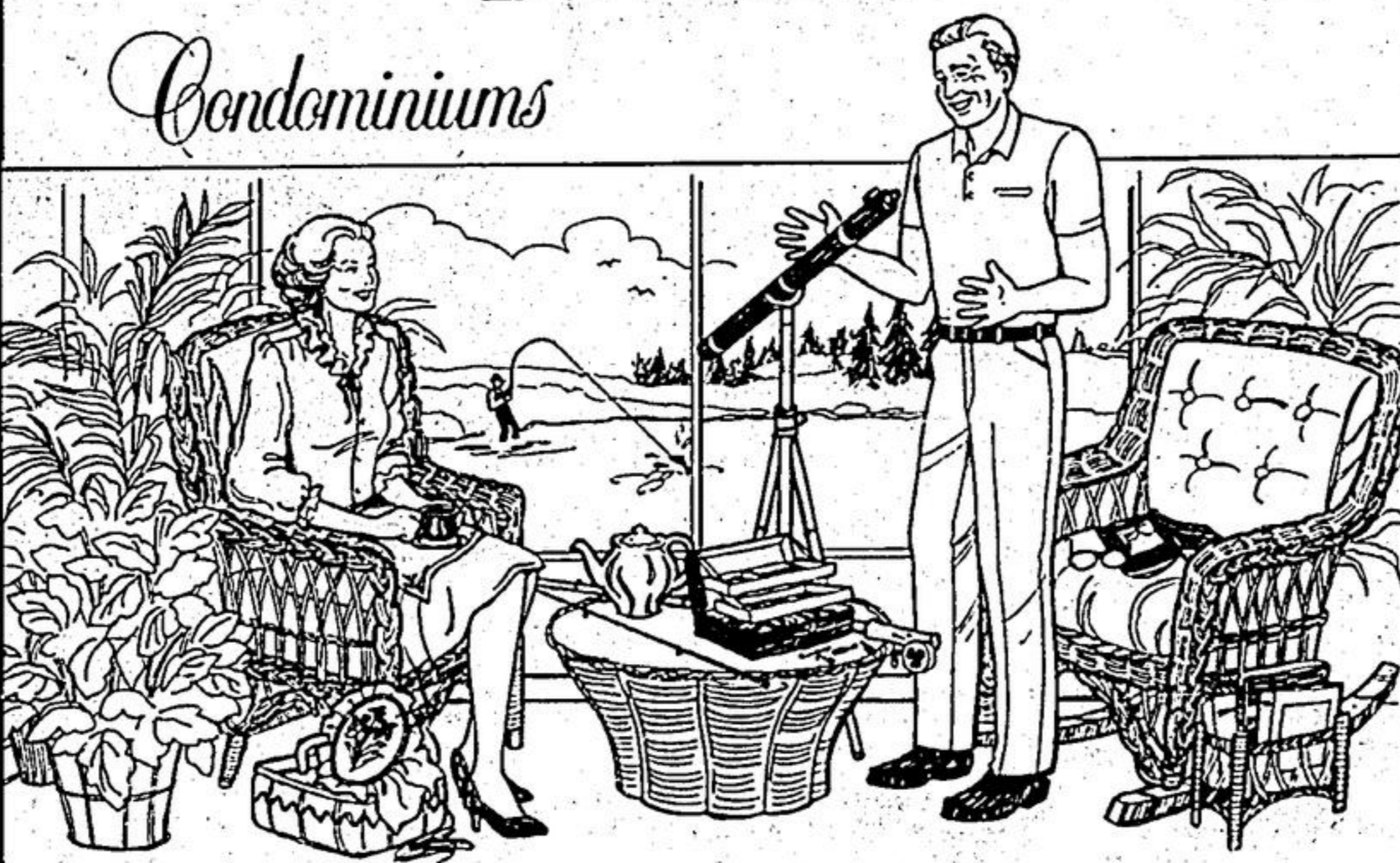

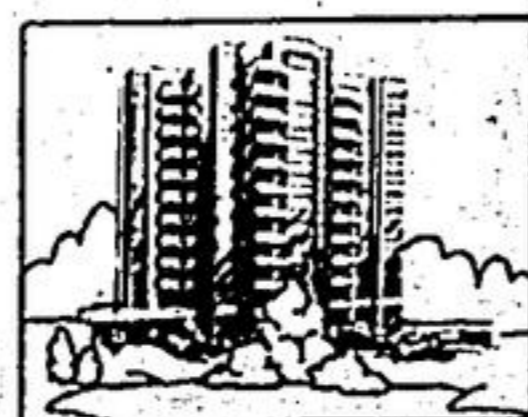
