LEMONVILLE — The community of Lemonville is noted for its prominent people—Earl Cook, a professional baseball pitcher; his wife Blanche, an accomplished speed skater; Grant Wells, a Canadian plowing champion and Tom Gayford, a world-famous equestrian coach. Five local residents that should be included in this list, form a musical group called "The Lemonville Lovelies". Mem-

bers are—Pauline Hirsch, Alida Nauta, Jean Nauta, Lois McGinn and Dorothy Duggan. They sing regularly at services in Lemonville United Church as well as senior citizens' homes around the area.

It was the late Dr. Stuart Crouch who came up with the name. "He was our greatest fan," Mrs Hirsch explained.

Original members included Myra (Mrs Wally Koster) and Debra (Mrs Maurice Smith). Mrs Crouch, now of Seaford, provided the accompaniment. Today, this task is assumed by the church organist, Arthur Critchley. However, on occasions, Alida plays her guitar.

"We make a joyful noise unto the Lord," is the way Mrs Hirsch describes their work. While others point to her as the "leader", she claims they're "all together". "We're one musical heartbeat," she says.

The group holds an early-morning practice every Thursday from 8 to 9 a.m., usually at the Hirsch home. This continues from early fall through late spring. "We take things a little easier during the summer," Pauline said.

Mrs Hirsch explained that their worship is heightened through involvement in worship. While none profess to be "trained" singers, the sincerity that accompanies their selections, warms the hearts of their listeners.

The "Lemonville Lovelies" are modest concerning the name. But to the congregation of "the little country church on the hill", it suits—inside and out.

Students may start business

Students wishing to start their own summer business may be eligible for an interest-free loan of up to \$2,000, Phil Gillies, Parliamentary Assistant to the Honourable Margaret Birch, Provincial Secretary for the Secretariat for Social Development, announced today.

"Last year we saw the number of businesses jump from 151 to 242. This year we are expecting even more students, to take advantage of the interest-free loans," Mrs. Birch said. The program is open to students 15 and over who are returning to school in the fall.

Those that have been successful in the past include: painting, landscaping and security services, as well as computer software production, boat rentals and fast food vending.

"This program develops a student's entrepreneurial skills and offers young people the opportunity to gain practical business experience," Phil Gillies, Parliamentary Assistant to Mrs. Birch said.

The Student Venture Capital Program is sponsored by the Secretariat for Social Development and administered by the Ontario Youth Secretariat in cooperation with the Royal Bank and the Ontario Chamber of Commerce.

Around all of this activity will be wrapped an exciting special events program featuring live theatre, with a resident theatrical group producing their own country brand of entertainment. The fully equipped theatre is planning a regular schedule of stage presentations, movies, slide shows, concerts and live demonstrations.

The concept of color, country style decor and lively excitement will be emphasized.
